HOOVER TAKES UP BYRNES ECONOMY PLEA

Past Rulers Back New Program Of Finance For Club Building

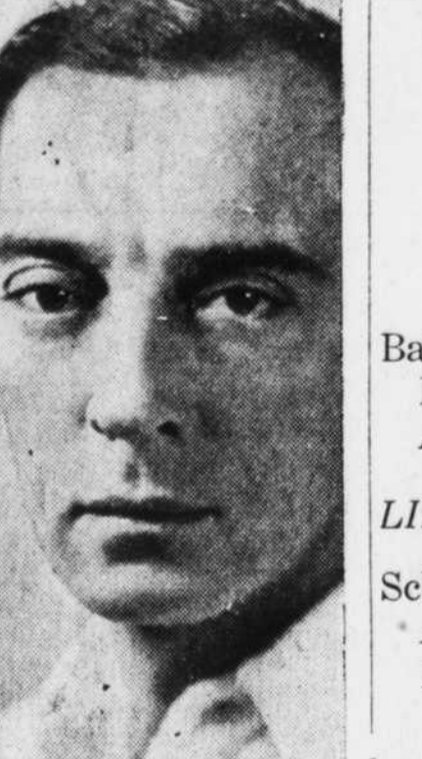
