LODGE, GRANT DEAL CLOSED

Negotiations for the use of the Masonic lot, located at Third and Fremont streets, by A. C. Grant, were completed yesterday and the lease was signed. The lease is for a period of ten years with option of renewal for an additional period of ten years, also an option to purchase the property on May 1, 1932, for \$35,000.

Construction work on the new garage and store building that will be erected on the property is expected to start next week, with the schedule calling for completion of the work within 90 days from the time the ground is broken.

The unit will contain one large store, 35x100 feet, that has already been leased for a period of five years; a garage, 30x30 that will house a grease and wash rack as well as a complete tire sales and service station, and a filling station.

The complete business offices of the Grant organization will occupy the second floor of the garage unit. There will be a basement which will be used as a storage room for tires and accessories. This feature will be unusual for desert construction, as few structures in this part of the country contain a basement or cellar.

Construction will be of cement block and stucco, with a trend towards the modernistic in the design of the building. The cost is estimated between \$15,000 and \$20,000.

The building has been designed by H. C. Nordstrom, building supervision will be by Paul A. Warner.
