ROYAL PLANS AWRY AGAIN

FONTAINEBLEAU, France, April 7. (UP)—The wedding plans of Prince and Princess Beatrice, daughter of the exiled king of Spain, were disrupted again today and friends of the princess expressed the belief that recent disappointments in her romance with Prince Alvaro might lead her to enter a convent.

The princess has often said she might become a nun, her friends disclosed, and it was believed that new difficulties in the way of her marriage might strengthen this desire.

DOLLAR HARD HIT IN PARIS

PARIS, April 7. (UP)—A new and more violent attack on the American dollar was launched today in Paris. As a result of the anti-dollar campaign, the dollar ranged in late trading to 25.32 francs, below the gold point, although it was significant that it previously had closed officially at 25.35. The campaign was climaxed by an article in the newspaper L'Ordre, owned by the French steel in crisis, which contended that a large American bank had ceased payments. The article was false and considered an insultly brazen as compared even to previous unbridled attacks on the dollar since last November.

DEMOS FIGHT TAX MEASURE

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 7. (UP)—Senate Democrats spoke the "death knell" of the manufacture sales tax today, but ran into a party controversy over taxes on the rich. The stock market leapt and included a "bull" rally in the billion dollar revenue bill. After a party conference on the tax bill, which now is being considered by the finance committee, Democratic Floor Leader Joseph T. Robinson, Ark., announced the house would not vote on the sales tax as regarded as "conclusive." This meant that the tax as they are not enough Republican votes to force its adoption.

BOATMEN SAVE FLOOD VICTIMS

ANTIGO, Wis., April 7. (UP)—Volunteer boatmen removed families from their homes tonight while firemen rescued others trapped when the swollen spring brook flooded city streets.
