Independent Merchants at Boulder Form Backbone of Thriving New Community

Businesses Would Be Asset To Larger Cities

Boulder City, the desert's latest oasis and spot of man-made beauty, now enjoys the reputation of being America's fastest growing city. Nor can it be classed with the boom towns of Colorado, Tonopah, Weepah or countless other mushroom growths of the gold rush decade, since the river city is being built for permanency with due consideration being given to rapid future growth.

DESERT MIRAGE
If the legions of desert rats and prospectors who roamed over this section of the desert in their quest of gold, could come suddenly upon this modern, progressive city, with its broad boulevards, well paved streets, flowers and foliage, they

might well think themselves the victims of a mirage.

A series of beautiful parks has been laid out throughout the city and within a year or two when present plans for landscaping and gardening have been completed, they will be unrivaled for sheer beauty in this part of the southwest.

The administration building, situated on a hill overlooking the city and commanding a majestic view of the Colorado basin and site of Hoover dam, is one of the finest pieces of architectural work in this section of Nevada.

The federal building, police station, hospital, theater and more than two score of business buildings comprise the downtown section of the city. Plans for further construction of hotels, restaurants and stores are now under consideration and the summer months will doubtless witness the carrying out

of a steady building program.

LANDSCAPING
Twelve large dormitories which house the single workmen employed on the project, surround the business district on the west, while the eight hundred homes of married and family men, containing from two to six rooms, make up the major portion of the residential district.

Within the last few weeks more than eleven carloads of trees, flowers and shrubs have been planted along the streets and parks by the reclamation bureau.

The present population of Boulder City is between 4,500 and 5,000 and it is expected that this number will be more than doubled within the next five years.

OREGON'S BOSS BURGOIN BAIL SET AT \$1,000



P. L. "Prink" Callison, 33, brilliant young Oregon university freshman coach, who has been elevated to head football coach succeeding Dr. Clarence W. Spears, resigned. Spears goes to Wisconsin as head gridiron mentor at \$10,000 a year. Callison formerly coached Medford, Ore., football teams to many state championships.

A charge of assault with a weapon with intent to do great bodily harm was filed against Maurice Shay Burgoin when he appeared before United States Commissioner W. J. Flowers in Las Vegas Thursday morning.

It is alleged that Burgoin attacked Samuel Lemmel with a large crescent wrench during an argument which culminated in a fist fight. Both men are employed on the Boulder dam project.

The defendant admitted striking Lemmel with the wrench, but denied that he hit him from behind, stating that he was facing his victim and that when he struck, Lemmel dodged, receiving the blow on the side of the head.

Burgoin entered a plea for clemency on the behalf of his family in San Francisco which was denied. He was held in \$1,000 bail to appear before federal court.

The assault occurred on the morning of April 6 and the defendant was arrested a short time later by Fred Jensen of the Boulder City police.
