ODDIE OFFERS SENATE AMENDMENT TO STRETCH DAM FUNDS 4 MILLIONS

WASHINGTON, April 8. (AP)—The amendment to the interior department appropriations bill to increase the \$5,000,000 allotted to the Boulder canyon project, to \$10,000,000, was introduced today by Senator Oddie of Nevada.

In effect, Oddie's amendment would restore the appropriation for Hoover dam to the figure recommended by the budget bureau in its estimate.

The house cut the fund to \$3,000,000 and the senate appropriations committee reduced it to \$6,000,000 after the interior bill was sent back to it with instructions to cut it to a \$45,000,000 aggregate.

Senator Oddie succeeded in bringing the house approved fund up to \$10,000,000 before the bill was sent back to the committee by the senate.

His campaign on the floor will be based on the grounds that upward of 500 men would be thrown out of work if the appropriation is reduced and that all advantage should be taken of present low construction costs.

BLAZE RUINS EARL APIARY

Fire destroyed a large portion of the famous bee hives of J. I. Earl, near Overton, late Thursday afternoon. The damage will run into several hundred dollars, without including the cost of replacement of hives and bee-stock, in the estimate.

The fire had its origin in the honey stealing escapade of two small boys. The youngsters endeavored to smoke out the bees in order to more easily procure their spoils, when the blaze got beyond their control.

Mr. Earl contemplates starting a civil suit against the parents of the boys in an effort to be reimbursed for his loss. There was no insurance carried on the hives.

WEBB PLEA IS HEARD IN L. V.

J. T. Webb, who was arrested on February 23 on a charge of possession of liquor on the Boulder City government reservation, and later convicted and fined \$100, appeared this morning before United States Commissioner W. J. Flowers at Las Vegas to ask that his sentence be deferred.

Unable to pay the fine, Webb has spent more than a month in jail and asked that he be released in order to return to work.

The case was referred to the United States attorney for disposition.

COHEN WILL DEFEND DUO
