SAN FRANCISCO, Apr. 8. (AP)—Long and short, hair styles have changed, but Helen Wills Woody, noted California tennis champion, and artist, followed no trends.

SCHMELING IN STATES; IS JAUNTY

NEW YORK, April 8. (AP)—Accompanied by his trainer, Max March, and guarded by Donna Blanka, the meanest police dog ever owned by a fighter, Max Schmeling, world's heavyweight champion, arrived in New York today and the steam-up for the title bout with Jack Sharkey here in June was on.

It was a jaunty and confident Schmeling that stepped from the Hamburg-American liner New York.

"Germany is all excited over my coming fight," Schmeling said. "The people back home want me to beat Sharkey decisively and erase the memory of my having won the championship on a foul."

Schmeling appeared healthy. He weighed 194 pounds, two above his usual weight.

"I'm boxing better than I ever did," the champion said. "I am stronger, and maybe taller. I am hitting much harder than I did one year ago."

He was asked about his choice of referee.

"I do not give one care who the referee may be," he said. "My two fists are my referee."

Joe Jacobs, Schmeling's manager, interrupted to assert that "we" would have George Blake, manager of Fidel La Barba, as referee if the choice was left to the champion. Both Schmeling and Jacobs regard Blake as the world's best referee.

Schmeling would not discuss his plans past the Sharkey fight. Especially he avoided comment as to a possible meeting with Jack Dempsey.

"I shall not cross any bridges until I come to them," he said.

"Just so long as I am healthy and feel young, that long shall I continue to box. No, I will not predict the outcome of my bout with Sharkey. Of course I shall not be disappointed if I finish him off in four rounds."

"No, I cannot compare Sharkey and Stripling. Maybe Sharkey is a little the better."

CHAMPS GIVEN TIME LIMITS

CHICAGO, April 8. (AP)—The National Boxing association today

notified two champions, Young Perez of France, heavyweight titleholder, and Al Brown, Panama negro who holds the bantamweight title, that they must defend their titles this month or have them vacated.

Perez' six months of grace expires April 26 and Brown's on April 27. Each champion is supposed to defend his title once every six months according to N. B. A. rules. Max Schmeling failed to live up to this rule, however, and was not suspended.

LEFT HOOKS

Indian Johnny Smith, welterweight champion of Nevada, is slated to box the main event at Reno next Wednesday night, April 13, according to a letter received by C. F. Social club here.

Jackson led all the way and in the fifth opened such a bad cut over Hadrian's eye that the referee stopped the fight.

In the other part of the double Main-event card, Husky Velasco, 130, San Diego, knocked out Billy Gordon, 129½, of Portland.

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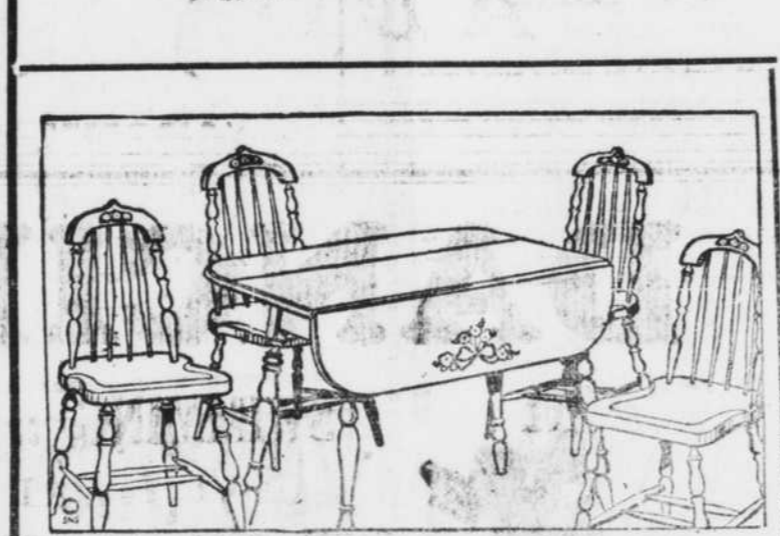
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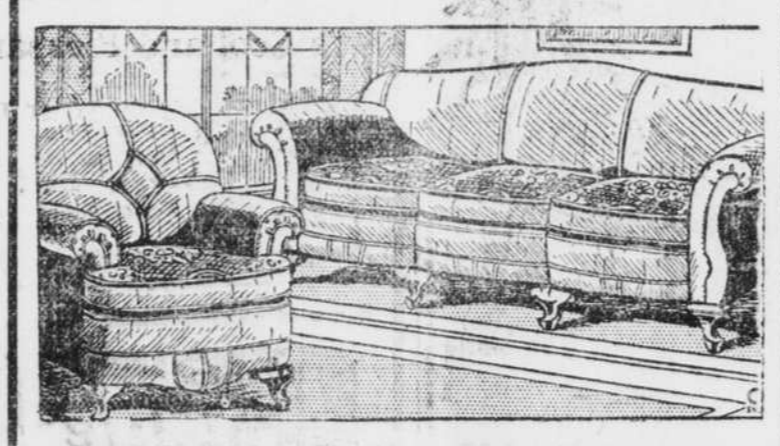
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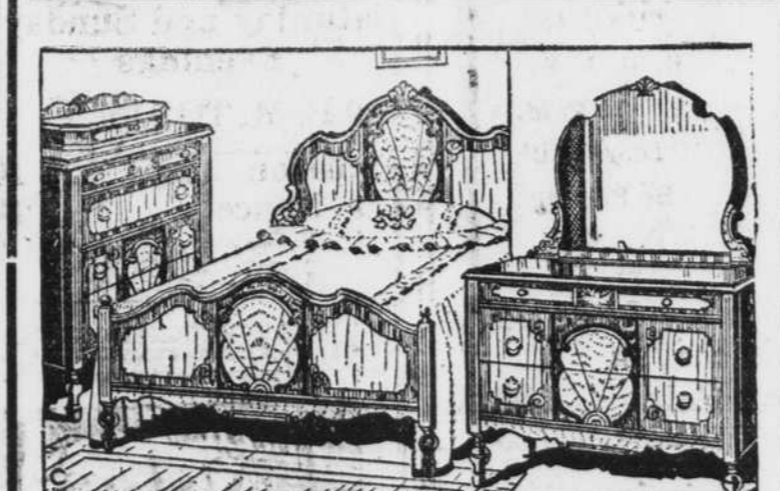
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
