WASHINGTON, April 11. (AP)—President Hoover tossed a new baseball over an umpire's head here today, officially opening the 1932 American league season...

ROOKIES MAY BE LEAGUE STARS

By GEORGE KIRKSEY (United Press Staff Correspondent) CHICAGO, April 11. (AP)—Rookie ball players promise to play leading roles in deciding the outcome of the two major league pennant races which gain full headway tomorrow.

No. since Tony Lazzeri and Mark Koenig were boldly thrown into the New York Yankees lineup as rookies and catapulted the team from seventh place in 1925 to the pennant the next season have newcomers had as much responsibility resting on their young shoulders.

Youngsters may make or break pennant contenders in either league. The Philadelphia Athletics are relying less on unproven material than any team with pennant possibilities in either circuit, but the A's must look to rookies if the three-time pennant-winning craft springs a leak in any department.

Connie Mack is banking on Catcher Madjeski, Pitchers Bowman and Cain, First Baseman Roettger, and Outfield Coleman for the bulk of the Athletics reserve strength.

Newcomers figure boldly in the plans of the other two leading American league contenders, New York and Washington. Joe McCarthy will try to emulate the later Miller Huggins' feat of injecting two rookies into the infield and winning a pennant the first year.

Frank Crosetti, who cost the Yanks \$75,000 and who batted .343 for San Francisco, will start the season at shortstop or third base and Jack Saltzgraver, who cost \$45,000 in cash and players and batted .340 for St. Paul, will make his debut at second base.

The Yanks expect John Allen, who won 21 and lost 9 for Jersey City and Toronto, and John Murphy, who won 16 and lost 13 for St. Paul, are expected to round out the Yanks' pitching staff.

HAFEY BUY GIVES REDS NEW CHANCE

CINCINNATI, April 11. (AP)—Acquisition of Chick Hafey, National league batting champion, on the eve of the baseball season opening, has made the Cincinnati Reds a first division probability and a long-shot possibility for first three places in the league.

Hafey, a determined holdout, was traded by the world champion St. Louis Cardinals for Benny Frey, pitcher, Harvey Hendrick, utility player and some cash.

While only the most rabid Cincinnati fans would predict a pennant for their club, baseball men here and in other major league cities saw the deal made today as one of the two really important trades engineered between seasons.

Of the 133 members, 68 picked the Yankees to win and 61 favored the A's, but the consensus gave the A's a percentage of 376 to the Yanks' 374.

In the National league 71 picked the Cards to win, with 35 favoring the Giants.
