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THE COTTONWOOD

JUST NOW the cottonwood trees come in for their full measure of abuse. The air is full of flying fluff. It sticks to our clothes and tickles our nose, although, so far as we can observe, it does no harm to health.

We all admit, however, that the cotton flying in the air at this season of the year is a nuisance. We have all the more reason for being peeved at is because the condition is entirely unnecessary.

Without injuring the beauty of the city, without seriously reducing the amount of grateful shade, the cotton nuisance can be eliminated. It will cause a little trouble and slight expense, but the more satisfactory condition of our city will a hundred times re-

The remedy is the simple one of cutting out the cotton-bearing trees.

It will be noticed that in most places there is about one tree in a group furnishing all the cotton. The other trees are of the male

variety and give off no cotton.

By cutting out an occasional tree here and there, the entire community may be rid of cotton. And that without reducing the shade materially, because in most cases the other trees would quickly spread out to fill the vacant space. Cottonwoods were invariably planted too close together at first, so we can remove half of them if necessary without interfering with our comfort.

A year or two ago a survey was made to mark all cotton bearing trees. Just now it does not take a sign to show which the cotton-trees are.

If people would just undertake the elimination of the cotton nuisance in the spirit of cooperation, it is probable that the wood which the trees will produce will more than pay the cost of removing them.

Las Vegas would be a more livable and happy place in which to live for two months

of the year.

The city board may declare the cotton a nuisance and have the offending trees destroyed. Yet it seems to The Age that it would be much better if the property owners of their own motion would remove the nuisance.

THE DAM HIGHWAY

A FEW YEARS hence, Hoover dam will be one of the outstanding scenic attractions of the great west. And the highway across the top of the dam will attract more tourist travel than any other piece of road in the entire country.

In the wide west there is nothing to excel in grandeur and beauty the desert scenery which the highway from Kingman to Las Vegas via the dam can show. It is a mixture of the strange, uncanny, garish coloring of the Devil's Paint Pot in the desert country with the sublime grandeur of mountain and canyon.

Union Pacific, as a consequence, reacted to a new record low of 50 while Santa Fe sold at 41, its lowest price since 1901. New York Central. Delaware & Hudson, Missouri-Kansas - Texas, and New Haven closed with losses of a fraction to more than two points

Oils also found the going rough, particularly the New Jersey and California Standards which were sold on reports that a hitch had developed in the negotiations for a merger of the two companies. Both made new bear market lows, Jersey closing off 2 points and California a point lower.

A surprising change of front in that perennial optimist, Charles M. Schwab, had only a momentary effect on the steel shares, which rallied nicely in the late pickup and closed higher. At a meeting of the Bethlehem Steel board, Schwab, who new used to be without a pair of rose-colored glasses, said:
