MARKETS AT A GLANCE

By OTTO E. STRUM (United Press Financial Writer) NEW YORK, April 12. (U.P.)—Rising wheat prices pumped some confidence into the financial community again today and the stock market gave a much better account of itself, closing on the crest of a late rally.

A good many stocks were lower the final gong, but such leaders as Steel, General Motors, American Can, American Telephone, General Electric, Westinghouse and Public Service showed nice gains, indicating that some of the stock thrown on the market by discouraged holders are being picked up by people who are not so sure that the country is going to the dogs.

It was not, however, until wheat added another cent and a half to its value, per bushel, that stocks picked themselves up from the lows of an earlier reaction. After a fair rise in the early trading, enough selling was attracted to push most of the list into new low ground again.

Acute weakness was in evidence in certain sections. Rails were sold heavily on an estimate that the forthcoming weekly carloadings report would show a drop of more than 25 per cent from 1931, the largest decline so far this year in this important yardstick of general business.

The Pacific, as a consequence, reacted to a new record low of 50 while Santa Fe sold at 41, its lowest price since 1901. New York Central, Delaware & Hudson, Missouri-Kansas-Texas, and New Haven closed with losses of a fraction to more than two points.

Oils also found the going rough, particularly the New Jersey and California Standards, which were sold on reports that a hitch had developed in the negotiations for a merger of the two companies. Both made new bear market lows, Jersey closing off 2 points and California a point lower.

A surprising change of front in that perennial optimist, Charles M. Schwab, had only a momentary effect on the steel shares, which rallied nicely in the late pickup and closed higher. At a meeting of the Bethlehem Steel board, Schwab, who new used to be without a pair of rose-colored glasses, said:

"Never in the 27 years we have gathered together have things appeared so depressing as at the present time." He was seconded by Eugene Grace, president of the corporation, who announced the "tide still running out, it has not turned yet."

Only a flurry of selling greeted these statements and the list turned upward again. In the late trading a fair demand was in evidence for representative shares. Utilities were subject to some more selling, but absorbed the pressure in good style. Consolidated Gas rallied from a new low of 49 1/2 to close slightly higher at 50 1/2.

Richard Whitney's defense of stock market practices attracted favorable comment in Wall Street again and sentiment was strengthened by the stock exchange head's statements that shorts and margin trading furnish a bulwark for the list.

United States government bonds stood out prominently in the bond list, rising to new highs for the year on a brisk demand, while the rest of the bond market, slumped again. Cotton rallied with wheat.

TUESDAY IN CONGRESS

By United Press SENATE Banking and currency committee adjourned its stock market investigation until Monday after Richard Whitney, head of the New York stock exchange, had revealed short positions in various stocks.

Finance committee agreed to conclude its hearings on the billion dollar house tax bill on April 22.

Special Assistant Attorney General Lord Garrison told judiciary committee that the present bankruptcy laws provide for little more than a wholesale cancellation of debts.

Judiciary sub-committee voted in favor of reporting favorably to the full committee the nomination of Judge James H. Wilkerson of Chicago for the federal circuit bench.

HOUSE Father Charles E. Coughlin of Detroit supporting the soldier bonus measure before the ways and means committee pleaded for revaluation of the dollar.

Rules committee approved plan for adding a rider to the legislative appropriation bill providing wage cuts for government workers.

Agriculture committee tables a bill appropriating \$5,000,000 for relief of southern farmers.

Petition presented to discharge the ways and means committee from further responsibility on the 2.75 per cent beer bill and thus force a vote by the house.

BRIGHT SPOTS IN BUSINESS

By United Press Norge Corp. reports increase of 241 per cent in first quarter sales over like period of 1931. Bradstreet's reports 565 business failures last week, against 580 in preceding week. Youngstown Sheet & Tube Co. resumes operations at three furnaces of its Campbell plant. Southern California Edison Co. Ltd. reports net income of \$15,215,798 for year ended March 31, against \$15,023,840 for year ended December 31, 1931. South Penn Oil Co. advances price of Corning crude oil 10 cents a barrel. New York, Ontario & Western railroad estimates first quarter net income at 150,000, compared with \$2,498 in like 1931 period. Ohio Electric Power Co. reports 1931 net income of \$243,466, against \$195,047 in 1930.

KANSAS CITY LIVESTOCK KANSAS CITY, Mo., April 12. (U.P.)—Reduced receipts sent sheep prices 15 cents higher today on the Kansas City livestock market and held cattle steady. Hogs, with excess supplies, were down 10 cents. Steers and yearlings sold from \$5.50 to \$7.75. Top fat hogs were reduced to \$3.60 and the bulk of sales ranged from \$3.60 to \$3.70. Spring lambs sold from \$7 to \$8.
