MISTY RUTH OPENS UP HIS OWN SEASON

NEW YORK, April 12. (UP)—Babe Ruth drove two home runs over the roof of the stadium today, helping the New York Yankees beat the champion Philadelphia Athletics, 12 to 6, and the 1932 baseball season was officially under way.

Actually, the season started in Washington yesterday when President Hoover threw out the first ball to start his home town Senators to victory over the Boston Red Sox, and there were five more "opening" games today. But Babe Ruth is baseball to most of America, and the season started with him.

Dramatically enough Ruth made his first homer in his initial step to the plate. He accepted an offering of big George Earnshaw, one of the 1931 season pitching honorees, and smashed the ball over the roof of houses back of the Philadelphia baseball park's right field.

It was a free-hitting game with a total of seven home runs recorded. Two rang from the bat of Sammy Byrd, Yankee outfielder, and others were made by Lou Gehrig, who tied Ruth for home run honors in 1931, and one each were made by Jimmy Foxx, handsome Philadelphia first baseman, and Al Simmons, of the Athletics, American league batting champion of 1931.

The National league feature was the Cincinnati victory over the Chicago Cubs. The game served to prove pre-season predictions. The Reds lost many a game by one and two-run margins during the past season. They sought battling strength during the winter. Standing 1 to 4 behind when the ninth inning started, they made four runs in this inning and won the game. Johnson and Benton pitched for the Reds. Root started for Chicago, and lasted until that ninth-inning rally was under way.

St. Louis Cardinals, world champions, won a dreary and one-sided victory over the Pittsburgh Pirates, 10-2. Flint Rhem pitched.

Big Eddie Brandt, Boston Braves left-hander, limited Brooklyn's Dodgers to five hits in the 8 to 3 victory his club scored over the Flatbush Cubs. Waite Hoyt began the game for Brooklyn but was succeeded by Hollis Thurston and Fred Heahach.

Philadelphia's Phillies and the New York Giants had a long-winded session at the Polo grounds here.
