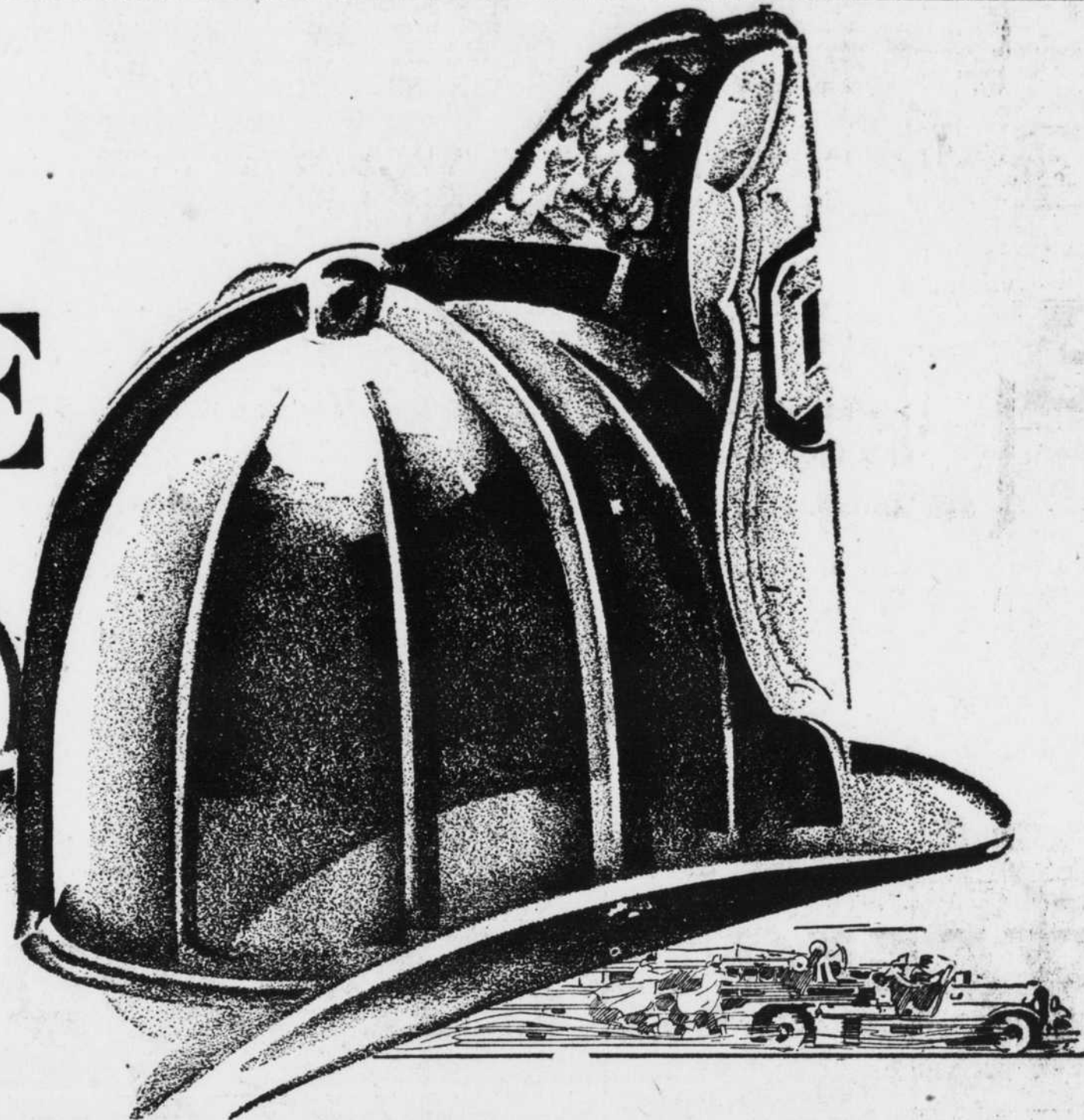
Mr. and Mrs. M. D. Bruce visited friends in Las Vegas yesterday.
