ORDER AUTOPSY IN DEATH OF BOULDER CITY INFANT

An autopsy on the body of Alberta Dearing, seven-months-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Dearing, who died some time Tuesday night in Boulder City, will be completed today by County Physician H. C. Vander Meulen. The autopsy is being made at the request of Coroner Frank M. Ryan, who was called to investigate the death of the baby when Dr. P. W. Williams of Boulder City refused to issue a death certificate.

Mrs. Dearing, who is only 18 years old, is prostrated at the death of her baby, this making the second occasion in two years that death has claimed an infant from the family on the thirteenth of the month. On September 13, 1930, the first-born child of the young mother died. According to the mother, she retired at 8:30 Tuesday evening, with the child in her arms. She was awakened several times during the night by the baby crying, but had no trouble in quieting the child. At five-thirty Wednesday morning she rushed into the bedroom of Mr. and Mrs. H. O. Harkness, 816 Seventh street, in whose home she is employed, and screamed: "Oh God, my baby is dead."

Mr. Harkness immediately summoned Dr. Williams, who in turn notified Chief of Police Glen E. Bodell.

Mrs. Dearing visited her husband,

George, whom she has been separated from for more than a month, in Las Vegas Monday. She spent the night there and returned to Boulder City the next day. Dearing was formerly employed by the Big 4 club.

Chief Bodell advanced the theories that the child had either accidentally smothered during the night or was poisoned by mistake. There were no marks or bruises on the body. A small amount of milk, a bottle of iodine and several toys and articles of clothing were turned over to officers to assist them in their investigation.

The possibility of kalsomine dropping into the baby's milk, from the newly painted walls, was pointed out by a member of the coroner's jury, but this explanation was discarded when medical men stated that had the death been caused by poisoning, signs of violent agitation of the baby's stomach, or convulsions, would have been obvious.

Mrs. Dearing is staying with Chief Bodell and his family and will remain at their residence until she has recovered from the nervous and mental strain caused by the death of her child.

The body is being held at the Palm funeral home in Las Vegas and burial arrangements will be made after the autopsy has been completed.
