FEDERAL PAY CUT HINDERED

WASHINGTON, April 13. (U.P.)—President Hoover's battle with the house economy committee over pay cuts for federal employees ended in a deadlock tonight. Neither side surrendered on their two widely divergent plans to save the taxpayers millions of dollars at the expense of government workers. The committee, after sitting all afternoon in the second White House conference with the President, adjourned until 10 a. m., tomorrow, when it will "give further consideration" to a new compromise salary cut plan submitted by Mr. Hoover.
