PERSSON PRESENTS B. C. LEGION WITH CHARTER AT THURSDAY MEETING

"It is with great pleasure that I present to you, Boulder City American Legion Post 31, a permanent charter which entitles you to all the rights and privileges of this great organization."

With these brief but dramatic words, Department Commander Roy Persson presented the coveted document to Vice-Commander Harry Lawton, who presided at the special meeting in the absence of Commander Skinner.

Persson recalled the formation of the Legion, which held its first caucus in Paris, France, with Col. Lindsay as chairman. He pointed out that by an act of congress in 1919 the national charter was adopted in Minneapolis, Minn., taking as their preamble, "For God and Country."

He closed his remarks by informing his comrades that the Legion now had more than a million active members.

Immediately after the charter presentation and the hearty applause that followed, the assemblage was addressed by Col. J. G. Scrugham, first national vice-commander and past department commander of Nevada.

Col. Scrugham talked straight from the shoulder, condemning the action taken at the national convention held at Detroit last summer, for their failure to present the true views of the Legion in regard to national prohibition.

With reference to the soldiers' bonus, Scrugham said he would propose the immediate payment of the bonus in silver.

B. G. McBride of Elko, alternate national executive committee member; Ormonde Bell, Winnemucca, past commander; and A. R. Thompson, commander of Las Vegas post, were included among those who attended the presentation.

On motion made by Frank Zeller, the Boulder City charter will not be closed until May 10. This action was taken to enable the post to add another 100 new members to the charter roll.

Commander Persson will meet with members of a committee headed by A. C. Grant, representing the Las Vegas post, tonight, to complete arrangements for the state convention to be held in Las Vegas in June.

WILL ORGANIZE SERVICE LEAGUE

NEW DENVER-L. A. RAILROAD MAY REACH HOOVER DAM; IS IDEA OF VETERAN 'HOGHEAD'

SALT LAKE CITY, April 9. (AP) — A veteran locomotive engineer's quarter-century dream of a water-grade railroad from Denver to the Pacific ocean appears in an application to the interstate commerce commission for permission to build the Denver Pacific line.

Twenty-five years ago, as he worked the throttle of a Santa Fe locomotive, Colman Crenshaw conceived the idea of the road. As he pulled trains on mountain grades of the Great Northern, on the Minneapolis & Omaha and the Pennsylvania, the dream persisted.

He was running a locomotive on the Mexican Central when the Madero revolution drove him from the southern Republic. "I couldn't forget the idea," he said. "Four years ago I flew over the route in an airplane and my conscience bothered me about it more than ever. But after I had incorporated the company, my conscience seemed to be satisfied."

Crenshaw does not minimize the difficulties of such a road, which as planned would follow the Colorado river through its rocky gorges from Glenwood Springs, Colo., to a point below the Hoover dam, and thence through the San Bernardino mountains in California to San Pedro harbor.

He estimates the cost of construction at \$100,000,000, and he says that financing has been arranged. Rolling stock and other equipment he figures at \$50,000,000 more.

It is on transcontinental freight and passenger traffic that Crenshaw depends to make the road pay. The scenic marvels of the Grand Canyon he expects to insure a heavy passenger business. A choice of routes is available around Grand Canyon park.



Solman Crenshaw dreamed of a water-grade railway from Denver to the Pacific ocean while handling the throttle on western mountain grades 25 years ago. Now he seeks permission to build the Denver Pacific railway (map), which he claims will cut 650 miles from the present distance.

He estimates the road's 860-mile length will cut 650 miles from the present distance from Denver to Los Angeles.

The road would be electrified with power from the Hoover dam. The maximum grade would be four per cent.

Although railroads in the region already have filed protests against the proposed new line, the veteran railroader appears confident that the commission will act favorably.

His optimism is shared by the other officers of his company, Thomas Hall, the vice president, and H. Miller, the secretary, both of them also former railroad workers.
