Gas Under Basement **Believed Cause Of Costly Blast**

COLUMBUS, Ohio., April 15. (U.P.) -Four experts on high explosives tonight told Governor George White they found no evidence of the use of dynamite or nitroglycerine in a preliminary examination of the shattered interior of the state's \$5,000,-000 office building which was rocked by an explosion late Thursday, killing eight men.

EXPERTS ON JOB The men were sent here by the Du Pont powder company on request of the executive in connection with an investigation to determine whether the disaster resulted from accident or a criminal act.

The explosion apparently came from a subterranean pocket beneath the basement. F. B. Pickle, Pittsburgh chemical engineer, said. He asserted high explosives would have torn a clean hole, but that the explosion had been general, wrecking two floors of the building and breaking holes in outer walls at two

The report came soon after the body of Robert Pfefferle, eighth fatality, was removed from the wreckage. Fifty-nine men were injured. The governor completed a day of
