1. It shall be unlawful for

the City of Las Vegas do ordane as follows:

Sec. 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, persons, firm, company, corporation or association, within the City of Las Vegas, to keep for sale at retail or to sell at retail any rocket, squib, firecracker, Roman candle, torpedo or other fireworks or substance designed or intended for pyrotechnic display.

Sec. 2. Any person or persons, firm, company, corporation or association who or which shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction there of shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$10.00 or more than \$100.00, or be imprisoned in the City Jail not less than five or more than \$100.00, or be imprisoned in the City Jail not less than five or more than fifty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.
