AUDIT SHOWS \$407 SHORTAGE

A shortage of \$407.30 was revealed yesterday after S. R. Whitehead completed an audit of the county and federal food accounts for prisoners.

During the period covered by the audit, more than 8,500 meals were furnished prisoners by the City Cafe, at 45¢ per meal. County warrants paid McCubrey totaled \$3,502.20, while receipts billed from the restaurant showed only \$3,402.40 due. This accounts for a discrepancy of \$103.00.

Federal accounts showed a short-

age of \$297.30 in the accounts paid by McCubrey from funds received from United States Marshal J. H. Fulmer of Carson City.

The audit was made at the request of Sheriff Joe Keate, who appeared before the county commissioners on April 5 and asked that the books be checked.
