NEW YORK, April 15. (AP)—The hitherto lowly Phillies took undisputed command of the topsy-turvy National league pennant race today by making a clean sweep of their abbreviated two-game series with the highly-touted Giants. Out-hit, 13 to 7, the Phillies muscled in on New York, 7 to 6.

Don Hurst, husky first baseman, clinched the game for Burt Shotton's boys when he drove out a homer in the seventh with the bases loaded. New York had the tying run on second in the ninth but was unable to push it across. Holly replaced Jumbo Elliott on the Phillies' mound in the seventh, and Grabowski followed in the eighth. Hubbell and Mooney hurled for the Giants.

The rest of the league zoomed into an old-fashioned dog fight, when the question mark aggregation of Dodgers walloped the Braves, 8 to 2; the rising Reds tumbled the Cubs, 8 to 2, and the Pirates fished a 9 to 7 game from the champion Cardinals.

A home run by Hack Wilson in the seventh, with two on, spelled victory for Max Carey's re-organized outfit at Ebbets field. Lefty Clark allowed the Braves eight hits, while Zachary and Frankhouse yielded nine.

The Pirates staged a seven-run parade in the fourth to clip the Cards' wings. Paul Waner's three bagger followed a series of singles to climax this inning. Jimmie Collins drove out a homer in the second to start the Card's scoring. He

also hit two doubles and a single in five times at bat.
The Washington Senators blanked the Red Sox again, 2 to 0, to continue leading the American circuit. Monty Weaver allowed Boston only four scattered hits. Horace Lisenbee pitched well for the Sox except in the second inning when Washington scored their two runs.

A 13-inning struggle between the St. Louis Browns and Chicago White Sox featured play in the junior circuit. Carey Selph, the season's prize draft, singled in the thirteenth to score Appling with the winning run for Chicago, beating the Browns, 4 to 3. Irving Hadley, formerly with the Senators, limited the Browns to seven hits while George Blaholder allowed 13.

At Philadelphia, the Athletics turned the tables on the Yankees and beat them, 9 to 8, in their second game of the season. With one out in the ninth, Simmons singled off Pipgras' glove and continued to third when Pipgras threw wild to first. Fox and Cramer were purposely passed, filling the bases.
