FRIDAY IN CONGRESS

SENATE
Senator Tydings, Dem., Md., charged that "log rolling" vote traders brought the oil tariff into the billion dollar house revenue bill. Banking and currency sub-committee agreed to report favorably a bill directing the federal reserve system to stabilize commodity prices.

Robert L. Cook of Boston informed the administration's proposed reforms of bankruptcy laws would be unconstitutional.

Senator Wagner, Dem., N. Y., urged repeal of the 18th amendment before a judiciary sub-committee.

Richard Whitney, head of the New York Stock exchange, warned the finance committee against results which might develop from increased taxation of stock transfers.

HOUSE
Democratic leaders said the government's \$200,000,000 economy program would be placed before the house early next week.

Rep. Condon, Dem., R. I., told the house ways and means committee the passage of the soldier bonus bill would not only aid the ex-servicemen but the "nation as a whole."

Rep. Purnell, Rep., Ind., introduced a bill authorizing the reconstruction finance corporation to advance \$100,000,000 to the agriculture department to finance sales of American wheat and cotton abroad.

COLORED SPEAKER HITS REPUBLICAN STAND ON LABOR

William Pickens, field secretary of the National Association of Colored People, flayed the present Republican administration before a packed house at the Majestic theatre Thursday evening.

Pickens asked fellow members of his race to remember that Hoover and his cabinet had made no provision for the employment of colored workmen on the dam project, when they went to the polls next fall. He strove to drive home the idea that if colored voters were not good enough to work on the dam, they were not good enough to vote the Republican ticket.

"There are more than twelve million negro voters in the United States, and it is almost within their power to swing the election of any candidate that they give their unbroken support," he said. Mayor Cragin introduced Pickens and J. P. Liddell, president of the

local Colored Citizens Protective association, to the audience. Nye Wilson, secretary of the chamber of commerce, and Leonard Blood, state and federal labor commissioner, gave short talks on the local and national employment and business situation.

The visit of Pickens was sponsored by the local association of colored residents, numbering more than two hundred members. This organization is full of energy and civic pride. Ward's Cash and Carry grocery and the Silver State market assisted materially in bringing the speaker here.

Pickens left at 10:05 a. m. Friday morning for Los Angeles. He was escorted to the airport by a delegation headed by O. B. Britton, chairman of the reception committee.

His home is in New York City, although he spends a great portion of his time traveling throughout the country, delivering lectures to colored societies.
