

GIANTS BRING BLUSH TO BACKERS' FACES

NEW YORK, April 19. (U.P.)—Apparently determined to shame, humiliate and embarrass the dozens of experts who picked them to run one-two in the National league this year, the New York Giants went out today and rang up their fifth defeat in six games played.

Today's game went to 13 innings before the Giants managed to lose, 8 to 7, to the Boston Braves. The Giants, with three errors, tried valiantly to lose in the regulation nine innings, but first baseman Bill Terry, for some reason or another, seemed to want to win. Terry slapped a homer in the sixth with one man on to put the Giants in the lead. He repeated this performance in the ninth to tie the score at 6-all, and in the thirteenth it was his triple which scored Lindstrom and threatened the Braves with defeat.

Boston scored the winning runs on Berger's three-bagger with Martini and Worthington on base. Travis Jackson celebrated his return to the Giants' lineup by making two luscious errors.

In the only other National league game played, the one-time Phillie Phanatic blasted Brooklyn's Robins, 10 to 2. Glenn Wright's home run with Ike Boone on base prevented Ray Benge from scoring a shutout. Benge held the Robins to five hits while his mates cracked out 14 hits off the slants of Hoyt, Shaute and Quinn for 14 safeties. The defeat was the second for Hoyt.

Joe Cronin's work at bat enabled the Washington Senators to defeat the Philadelphia Athletics, 7 to 4. Cronin gathered three hits, one a home run.

Both clubs used two pitchers.

After holding the Cleveland Indians scoreless for six innings, Sam Jones softened up and the Indians came through with a 4 to 2 victory over the Chicago White Sox. Bill Hudlin pitched for Cleveland and was nicked for but five hits.

GERMAN YOUTH WINS MARATHON

BOSTON, April 19. (U.P.)—Paul De Bruyn, 24-year old German with the build of a middleweight boxer, today outraced a fast field of 222 to win in near-record time the 36th annual Boston A. A. marathon.

With but 18 months of long distance running experience behind him, De Bruyn, the German marathon champion, covered the 26 miles and 385 yards of hill-and-dale madam between Hopkinton and Boston in 2 hours and 33 minutes and 36 2-5 seconds. This was only 27 and 3-5 seconds slower than the record established by Johnny Miles in 1929.

Sharing honors with De Bruyn was James Patrick "Finky" Henigan of Medford, last year's winner. By placing second, this veteran, nearly 41 years old and father of five children, won a place on the United States Olympic team, since he was the first American to finish. Henigan's time was 2 hours 34 minutes and 32 seconds—55 3-5 seconds slower than De Bruyn's time, but 12 1/2 minutes faster than Henigan's winning time of last year.

Two outstanding favorites, Clarence H. De Mar, 43-year old Keene, N. H., school teacher, and seventh winner of the classic, and Willie Ritola, Olympic 5000 metre champion, made disappointing showings. De Mar finished eighteenth, 13 minutes behind De Bruyn—while Ritola had to drop out after running 15 miles.

NEW LEGION CARD IS LINED UP FOR FRIDAY

Farrell Meets Coast Battler In Top Event

The last fight before the semi-final will find Max Perez and Ernie Smith, both Las Vegas boys, in the ring, for a four round tussle. Both of these boxers are popular with local fight fans and should put up a considerable scrap.

Two other four round bouts will complete the card. The gong rings for the first event at 8:30 and a capacity crowd is expected to attend.
