TUESDAY IN CONGRESS

By United Press SENATE Inland oil producers opposed proposed oil tax in house revenue bill being considered by finance committee. Manufactures committee voted unfavorable report on Bingham bill legalizing four per cent beer. Judge H. D. Rummel, of Charleston, West Va., counsel for the National Coal association, warned a sub-committee that measures proposing federal regulation of the coal industry were unconstitutional. Senator Fletcher, Dem., Fla., introduced a bill to restore the purchasing power of the dollar by returning to the general level of commodity prices prevailing in 1926. Defeated a measure proposing to reduce from \$175,000 to \$100,000 appropriations for office rentals abroad utilized by Commerce department. HOUSE Economy committee considered President Hoover's "stagger-furlough" economy suggestion. Naval appropriation bill submitted to house with warning from Chairman Ayres of sub-committee that sea defense must not be further reduced. Rep. LaGuardia, Repn., N. Y., accused his colleagues of political cowardice as he opened the anti-bonus drive before the ways and means committee.

RED - JAP WAR LOOMS AGAIN

The Soviet-Japanese war scare in the far east was revived Monday in Moscow, Tokio and Geneva. Official sources in Moscow said Russia was prepared for national defense; troops are concentrated on the Manchurian frontier; and the Soviet government is ready to resist plots to provoke war by white Russians (anti-Communists, and certain Japanese militarists). In Tokio a government spokesman described extensive Soviet concentrations as showing that Russia is ready to fight either offensively or defensively and hinted that Russian communists were responsible for bombing a Japanese troop train.

FLAMES STRIKE POWDER STORES

BUENOS AIRES, April 20. (U.P.)—Fire broke out in the naval arsenal warehouses tonight and a serious conflagration was threatened due to the munitions in the warehouses. Several loud explosions occurred and were heard throughout the city.

TOKIO, Tuesday, April 20. (U.P.)—A military gun powder magazine in Takinokawa, a suburb of Tokio, was destroyed today by explosions which damaged more than 50 houses.

FREE SERVICE ON RADIATORS GIVEN

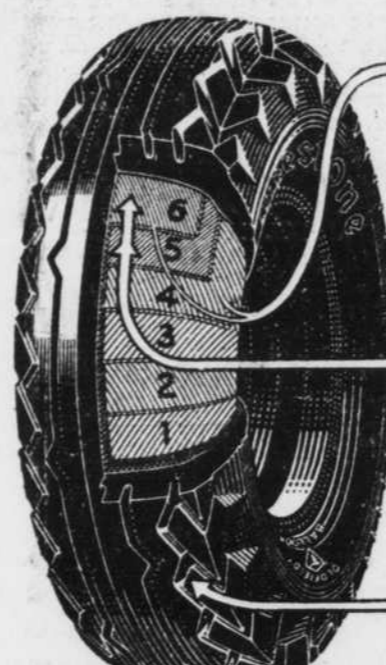
