KILLERS GET RING

Too Many Wives Given As Cause of Death; Jealousy Motive

By SIDNEY B. WHIPPLE (United Press Staff Correspondent) MINEOLA, L. I., April 20. (U.P.)—Vengeance struck viciously out of the darkness today to kill Edward B. Brinker, who was separated from a meek mannered wife in Brooklyn, lived with another woman in Jackson Heights, and was wooing a third, unmarried working girl.

Brinker and the girl had battled for their lives. The soil around them was ripped and churned. Dirt was ground into their bodies. Their clothes were in ribbons.

Even before the police began the routine task of tracing Edward Brinker, Long Island detectives, after one look at the scene, said: "Jealousy—revenge."

The money in Brinker's pockets had not been touched. But a ring he is known to have worn had been wrenched from his finger. Not a paper in his coat had been disturbed. There was no attempt to conceal his identity. It was as though the slayers, callous of consequences, had told the police who he was and defied them to do their worst.
