BUILDERS' EXCHANGE

BUILDING operations in Las Vegas have assumed such importance as to warrant an organization of those who are engaged in the building trades.

The object, or at least one object of the organization, is to eliminate destructive competition and place the industry on a basis fair to both owner and builder. The policies of the organization, if made effective, would reduce the average of building costs through the elimination of losses which frequently come to building owners through the cutting of prices by irresponsible contractors who not only slight the work but too often draw all the money they can on a job and leave it only partly finished.

Through the organization prospective builders will be kept informed as to whom it is safe to employ and will be protected from the numbers of irresponsible men who rush in and take contracts at any figure with the expectation of defrauding the owner in one way or another.

Another service the Builders Exchange can perform for the community is to keep before the public information on prospective building operations and promote a sane and safe growth of the city.

The exchange of information between the public, the exchange and the labor organizations is another thing which will assist materially in stabilizing building operations and maintaining steady employment for the workmen in the various building crafts.

READY TO FIGHT

FOR MONTHS Republicans have let the Democrats do most of the talking. The party of criticism has been rampant in its efforts to place the blame for the world's woes on President Hoover. The Republicans for more than two years watched the process, some of them half convinced that the Republican administration might partially at least, be to blame for conditions.

Time is working its own cure so far as President Hoover and the Republican party are concerned. Democratic criticisms have, for the most part, fallen flat. So much so that there has been but little in common between the various elements of the Democratic party, one criticising this, another something entirely different. There has not been and there is not today any cohesion of principle, sentiment or idea in the Democratic party.

It was reasonable to suppose that, if the Republican president and the Republican policies were much at fault, a formidable public sentiment would result in the crystallization of clear and definite policies by the Democratic party. That principles and policies would be formed to bind the party into one harmonious whole.

Nothing of the kind has occurred. Public consciousness has been forced to recognize the fact that President Hoover's proposals and policies in meeting the most terrible situation which has confronted any president since Lincoln, have been wise. The fact that has, through the entire crisis, been the prerogative of the whole people, has been forced in us.

Moreover, we have now reached the point where public opinion is beginning to recognize the fact that the country has been exceedingly fortunate in having in the White House at this time a man of Hoover's peculiar genius and character.

A WASHINGTON BYSTANDER

WASHINGTON—Be it a fight or a frolic, that chunky and dynamic product of the sidewalks of New York, Rep. Fiorello Henry LaGuardia, is bound to be somewhere close to the center of things.

At this writing he promises to go down in house history as the great coalitionist of the seventy-second congress.

If any member of that body, vexed with their line party majorities as it is, has made opportunity serve his need more effectively than the embattled LaGuardia, not even excepting Speaker Garner, the records disclose him not.

LaGuardia has difficulty himself in finding a political label suitable to his political philosophy. He abhors the "radical" classification so frequently conferred upon him. He has been in congress under three different party flags since he first joined up in 1917, only to rush off to war.

He has figured on the books as a Republican, a Socialist, a Progressive Republican. Now he thinks "legislative individualist" would about fit him. Presumably that means he belongs to just no party at all.

Yet some 200,000 of old Father Knickerbocker's children dwelling between the upper right hand sector of Central park and East river, with an overflow insular population bordering the big and little Hell Gates, seem to approve highly of the LaGuardia party comings and goings. They have sent him back to Washington six times now.

That Mr. LaGuardia is making political hay while the economic sun falls to shine is to be inferred from his place at various off-the-reservation council tables since congress convened in December.

On prohibition, or rather, anti-prohibition, his place as a wet bloc has been operating a guerrilla campaign on that subject.

Now Mr. LaGuardia has to his credit a successful tilt with the sales tax political dragon. He has helped to organize also bonus and anti-government pay cut conditions as his next legislative individualism enterprise.

Out of all this has come a mass of LaGuardia publicity, that life blood of political careers.

BUT WHITHER?
Yet, where can he be going? Whatever third party symptoms have yet developed are highly agricultural in character.

A lad geographically imbedded in the heart of the nation's greatest city, surrounded by Tammany Democrats, would not seem to offer much of a parking place for third party presidential honors.

Which probably does not disturb the happy and busy Mr. LaGuardia in the least. He just loves the fight for the sake of the fight itself.

Any person or persons, firm, company, corporation or association who or which shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$100, nor more than \$500, or be imprisoned in the City Jail not less than five or more than fifty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.
Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force upon and after its passage and publication one week (6 issues) in Las Vegas Age, a daily newspaper published in said City of Las Vegas.
The foregoing ordinance was adopted at a recessed regular meeting of said Board, held on the 12th day of April, 1932, as an emergency ordinance, pursuant to a Resolution adopted making same an emergency ordinance upon the vote of the entire Board.
