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BUILDERS' EXCHANGE

BUILDING operations in Las Vegas have assumed such importance as to warrant an organization of those who are engaged in the building trades.

The object, or at least one object of the organization, is to eliminate destructive competition and place the industry on a basis fair to both owner and builder. The policies of the organization, if made effective, would reduce the average of building costs through the elimination of losses which frequently come to building owners through the cutting of prices by irresponsible contractors who not only slight the work but too often draw all the money they can on a job and leave it only partly finished.

Through the organization prospective builders will be kept informed as to whom it is safe to employ and will be protected from the numbers of irresponsible men who rush in and take contracts at any figure with the expectation of defrauding the owner in one way or another.

Another service the Builders Exchange can perform for the community is to keep before the public information on prospective building operations and promote a sane and safe growth of the city.

The exchange of information between the public, the exchange and the labor organizations is another thing which will assist materially in stabilizing building operations and maintaining steady employment for the workmen in the various building crafts.

ORDINANCE No. 186

An Ordinance to prohibit the sale or keeping for sale of fireworks in the City of Las Vegas, and prescribing a punishment therefor.

The Board of Commissioners of the City of Las Vegas, and prescribing a punishment therefor. he Board of Commissioners of City of Las Vegas do ordain as

the City of Las Vegas do ordain as follows:

Sec. 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, persons, firm, company, corporation or association, within the City of Las Vegas, to keep for sale at retail or to sell at retail any rocket, squib, firecracker, Roman candle, torpedo or other fireworks or substance designed or intended for pyrotechnic display.

Sec. 2. Any person or persons, firm, company, corporation or association who or which shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than five or more than \$100.00, or be imprisoned in the City Jail not less than five or more than fifty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take
