

YANKEES DOWN A'S 8 TO 3 IN HOME GAME

By JACK CUDDY (United Press Staff Correspondent) NEW YORK, April 20. (U.P.)—The New York Yankees opened their home season today to the music of a 41-piece band and the whanging of ash bats as they blasted out three homers off the mighty Grove and Earnshaw to down Connie Mack's Athletics, 8 to 3.

Babe Ruth crawled out of his sick bed and thrilled some 65,000 fans in the bunting-hung stadium by smacking his season's fourth homer into the right field bleachers in the third, scoring Lyn Lary ahead of him. The Babe had been ill with a touch of grippe.

Lary started the Yank scoring in the first by driving one of Lefty Grove's choice offerings into the right bleachers for his first homer of the season. Bill Dickey found the same spot with another circuit clout in the eighth. Cochrane homered for the A's in the fourth, his season's third.

Lefty Gomez went the route for New York and yielded only nine scattered hits. He struck out nine. Earnshaw relieved Grove in the seventh. They were found for nine hits. Catcher Cochrane let two runs in on two passed balls.

Walter Johnson's Senators and the Detroit Tigers remained tied for first place in the American league race as Washington nosed out the Boston Red Sox, 4 to 3, and Detroit beat Cleveland, 2 to 1.
