MARKETS AT A GLANCE

By OTTO E. STRUM (United Press Financial Writer) NEW YORK, April 22 (U.P.)—Leading stocks were taken for another selling ride today and sold at their lowest levels in many years. Stocks were dumped overboard by traders who were disgruntled by failure of the local reserve bank to cut its discount rate and discouraged by failure of the local reserve bank to cut its discount rate and discouraged by the dismal notes sounded in the weekly business reviews.

With its usual single-track perspective, Wall street could find nothing at all in the day's news to warrant any confidence and the decline in stocks encountered no resistance from its inception at the starting bell.

Potential buyers of stocks were still shaking in their boots because of the uncertain economic and political outlook. Not even a statement by Percy A. Rockefeller, nephew of John D., that he was long of the market and considered the present market a fatal one for shorts started anybody bidding for shares.

In the absence of short covering or support of any kind whatever, the market was allowed to drift over in apathetic trading. Steel common and preferred were ungraded with approach of the corporation's dividend meeting next week, at which it is conceded the common dividend hasn't got a chance. Steel touched 28 1/2 before the close, which was around that figure.

Incipient dividend trouble also resulted in considerable selling pressure against American Telephone, American Can, Standard of New Jersey and Allied Chemical, all of which slumped to the lowest levels of the bear market. Of leading interest, however, was a reversal in the recent form of the rails and wide breaks in several of the carriers betokened they had lost a lot of their erstwhile friends.

Delaware & Hudson, Norfolk & Western, Union Pacific, New York Central, Atchafalaya, and Missouri Pacific preferred were the hardest hit and closed with losses ranging from 1 to 7 points. Somewhat smaller declines were made by Lackawanna, Missouri Pacific common and others.

A break in the ordinarily staid group of tobacco stocks was another development that Wall street didn't like a bit. It started when a March report by the internal revenue bureau showed a drop of 13 per cent in cigarette output from a year ago. A new low for the year was made by R. J. Reynolds B, while American Tobacco B dropped substantially.

Utilities generally played follow the leader, with American Telephone grazing the latter position, so that the group as a whole was considerably lower. Public Service dropped almost 3 points. General Motors and other shares of that ilk moved lower fractionally. So did most of the oils.

If the stock market looked to bonds and commodities for any encouragement, it was cruelly disappointed. Bonds forgot all about their steady rise of the last few sessions and turned lower, while wheat dropped another cent and more a bushel and cotton slumped more than 50 cents a bale.

KANSAS CITY LIVESTOCK KANSAS CITY, Mo., April 22 (U.P.)—Excessive supplies took hog prices down 10 cents today on the Kansas City livestock market. Sheep receipts also were heavy but the demand held prices unchanged. Cattle supplies were light and the market remained unchanged. Steers and yearlings ranged from \$5 to \$7.75. Top fat hogs brought \$3.85 and the bulk of sales ranged from \$3.50 to \$3.60. Spring lambs brought from \$6 to \$7.75.
