TIGERS GRASP HOLD ON TOP RUNG OF LADDER

NEW YORK, April 22. (U.P.—Conn) Mack, lean, grey-haired manager of the Philadelphia Athletics, remained unperturbed today when word was received that those amazing Detroit Tigers had secured a firmer footing on the top of the American league ladder by swamping Cleveland again, 16 to 3.

"It's a little too early in the season to get excited about anything yet," he reassured smilingly as he lounged back in a huge leather chair in the lobby of the Alamac.

"Actually I'm glad to see Detroit getting a running start. They'll need it in a few weeks when warm baseball weather arrives and the Yanks, Senators and Athletics begin hitting their stride."

The veteran pilot of the American league champions emphasized that the Tigers comprised perhaps the youngest team in the American league, and that youngsters usually go off to a better start than veterans in the cold weeks.

"But," he declared, "I'm confident they'll not remain in the lead when the other boys get going. It's a little too early to make any analysis of the race, but I feel certain it will develop into a hot fight between New York, Washington and Philadelphia. Good showings by the other teams help make the race more interesting."

He admitted he was not satisfied with the work of the A's thus far, but he was confident they would begin playing championship baseball shortly.

"Don't think for a minute that I'm sure we will win the pennant this year," he cautioned. "The senators played below their standard last year. They are showing great improvement already. Moreover, the Yankees are stronger. We will be fortunate to finish among the first three. Anyway, it looks like a good fight, and that's what everyone wants."

John Wyatt, 24, pitching his first major league season as a regular, scored his third victory of the season, holding Cleveland to ten scattered hits as his Tiger teammates blasted out 22 safeties. Wyatt helped the parade by homering in the ninth. Detroit's left fielder, Stone, homered in the third. Five Cleveland pitchers performed at intervals. Connally, Hildebrand, Jablowski, Pearson and Brown.

In the only other American league game scheduled, the St. Louis Browns beat the Chicago White Sox, 4 to 1. Melillo's homer with a man on started the Browns scoring in the fourth. Caraway and Gregory allowed the Browns eight hits, while Coffman and Gray yielded seven.

The champion St. Louis Cardinals ended their losing streak at six games by beating the Pittsburgh Pirates, 5 to 3, in 10 innings. They scored two runs in the tenth on two walks and three first errors. Paul Waner batted in all the Pirate runs with a homer and two singles.

Memphis Bill Terry blasted out his sixth home run in four days to aid the New York Giants in their third straight victory over the Philadelphia Phillies, 13 to 8. His clout came in the second inning and equaled the modern record of six home runs in four consecutive games held jointly by Babe Ruth, Key Williams and Chuck Klein.

The Boston Braves scored their second straight win over the Brooklyn Dodgers, 4 to 1. Bob Brown, recruit right hander for the Braves, downed the mighty Dazzy Vance of Brooklyn. Brown allowed only five scattered hits, but Dazzy was removed in the sixth after the Braves had four runs on eight hits. Babe Phelps and Moore completed the game.

The Chicago Cubs scored five runs in three innings, to defeat the Cincinnati Reds, 5 to 4. The Reds out-hit the Cubs, 9 to 8, but lost. Benton and Wysong hurled for Cincinnati, and Bush and Root for Chicago.
