FEDERAL COURT INJUNCTION IS GRANTED SIX CO.

CARSON CITY, Nev., April 28. (AP)—Federal court today granted an injunction restraining the state of Nevada from enforcing its mining laws within the Boulder Dam reservation, but failed to rule on the validity of the reservation itself.

The injunction was sought by Six Companies, Inc., contractors building the huge Hoover Dam project, when the state attempted to prevent it from using gasoline trucks underground in the construction of the our great tunnels on the grounds that the obnoxious gases from the truck exhausts would be detrimental to the men working in the bores.

Work has been pushed pending the determination of the suit and at the present time the work is practically completed. Judge Frank Norcross, who heard the arguments, with Circuit Judges Sawtelle and Wilbur, wrote the opinion, carefully avoiding the question of the legality of the reservation.

It is expected that the shooting will be completed and the films released within the next two weeks. After leaving Las Vegas the cameramen will visit Death valley and other nearby points of interest to secure material for the Metrotone newsreel.
