'BETTER HOMES' WEEK BEING OBSERVED BY ALL

This week is being observed as "Better Homes" week in every one of the 48 states in the union, according to Ray Lyman Wilbur, secretary of the interior, who succeeded President Hoover as president of Better Homes in America.

"All persons, whether young or old, have it within their power to make a definite and useful contribution to national welfare by earnest effort to clean up and improve their own homes and premises and to help raise the standards of the communities in which they are citizens. National Better Homes week offers an opportunity, by individual and collective effort, to provide a more healthful and wholesome environment for the growing child while building a community of which he may well be proud," said Sec. Wilbur.

"Over 8500 American communities have organized committees of forward-looking citizens and of representatives of civic, educational and business groups to stimulate well-considered programs for home improvement in which the citizens may participate. These culminate in National Better Homes week, which is being observed not only by lectures and discussions but by special programs in the schools, contests for the improvement of homes, kitchens and gardens, and by demonstrations of new or reconstructed homes within the reach of families of moderate income. Schools and colleges often share in the preparations made for the furnishing of such demonstration homes or the planting of their grounds. Thousands of persons have been helped to employment through special programs on home care and repair as a means of unemployment relief. Hundreds of tours are being conducted of homes that have made specific improvements in the course of the past year so that home owners may be informed of the better ways of making improvements appropriate to their needs.

HEAVYWEIGHTS READY FOR CHICAGO FIGHT

United Press Staff Correspondent, CHICAGO, April 28. (U.P.)—Mickey Walker, the stout-hearted little Jersey Irishman, and King Levinsky, the awkward, hard-hitting Chicago Hebrew, will meet in an important 10-round heavyweight bout in the Chicago stadium tomorrow night, which is expected to attract 20,000 customers and \$70,000.

The winner will join Ernie Schaefer of Boston as the leading heavyweight challenger and will be in a position to fight his way into a match with the victor of the Schmeling-Sharkey bout in June.

Walker, apparently in first-class fighting shape despite little activity since he held Jack Sharkey to a draw last July, continued to rule a 7-5 favorite despite the many physical handicaps facing him.

Levinsky, weighing about 198, will have a 28-pound pull in the weights, a 4 1/2 inch advantage in height, an inch and a half longer reach, and is almost 11 years younger. Walker will be 32 in July and Levinsky has just turned 21. Walker probably will weigh 170.

One of the new men bigger than Walker ever to lick him was Tommy Loughran, who successfully defended his light-heavyweight title against Mickey here in 1929 although the referee cast his vote for Walker. That was the last fight lost by Walker, who in his climb up the pugilistic ladder has held the welterweight and middleweight championships and fought most of the great fighters from 147 pounds up during the past ten years.
