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## HONOLULU VERDICT

**NOT ONLY** United States' garden islands in the Pacific, but the whole mainland, was surprised yesterday afternoon when the polyglot jury in the Hawaiian "honor slaying" trial found Lieut. Massie, his mother-in-law, Mrs. Fortescue, and two enlisted men guilty of manslaughter.

Which all goes back to the courtroom axiom that you can never tell which way a jury will swing.

Probably the only person who felt that the verdict would be guilty was Massie himself. We base the statement on the fact that many men, facing trial on serious charges know through some unexplainable sixth sense that the jury will acquit or convict them, as the case may be.

There is every indication that Massie, even when it seemed that the jury would be deadlocked, knew, or felt, that he and his companions would be found guilty.

While courtroom veterans such as Darrow, and even Kelly the prosecutor, were at a loss as to what the six caucasians and the six natives would do; Massie, and perhaps the dignified mother of his wife, knew what to expect.

Doubtless Darrow will appeal. Probably a change of venue will be obtained and the case will be brought to the mainland, where perhaps the navy group will be turned free.

Despite the condescension of the jury, who reduced a second degree murder charge to manslaughter, and then recommended leniency, there are few persons in the nation who feel that this avenging group should ever be imprisoned.

## WET PLANK?

**IN RENO** tonight state Republican leaders will select those who will represent the party at the national convention.

Associated Press dispatches to The Age indicate that Mayor E. E. Roberts of Reno will, in his keynote address, urge the inclusion of a wet plank in the platform. Seven days ago Roberts said that he preferred to steer shy of the prohibition question. Seven months before that, he suggested that open barrels of good whiskey be placed on Reno street corners instead of drinking fountains.

To be wet, or not to be wet? It's not really an important question in this state meeting, no matter how the Honorable Ed Roberts stands for the moment.

The thing is that the Nevada delegation will in all probability be instructed to get squarely behind President Hoover for the nomination. Other wise state conventions will instruct their delegates similarly. Thinking voters of both parties will undoubtedly approve such action.

## WOULD WIDEN OGDEN STREET

Property owners in the Ogdren street area have advanced the proposal that the street be widened to at least 100 feet, by taking ten feet from property located on either side of the thoroughfare.

Basing their plans on the theory that Ogdren street is destined to surpass Fremont street as the main business artery in the city, they point out the fact that there is now ample room for development as the street in question has few business establishments located on it at present.

Although the proposal has been under consideration for several weeks, no action has been taken. It is believed that some property owners would object, as the widening process would mean the demolition of certain buildings or sections of buildings recently completed.
