

# ROOKIE HURLER WINS FOURTH STRAIGHT GAME

NEW YORK, April 29 (U.P.)—Monte Weaver, outstanding rookie pitcher of the season, strode out onto the Washington mound today and downed the mighty George Earnshaw in a hurling duel, as his Senator teammates nosed out the Philadelphia Athletics, 2 to 1.

It marked four straight victories in four starts for the North Carolina lad, pitching his first season in the major leagues. The rookie from the Baltimore Orioles yielded only five hits, while Earnshaw, hero of several world series campaigns, was found for seven.

Today's victory kept the Senators hot on the trail of the leading New York Yankees, who continued to hold a slight edge by beating the Boston Red Sox, 8 to 7. The Yanks scored two runs each in the first, second, third and fifth. Boston valiantly tried to rescue the game in the fifth with a five-run rally. They tallied one in the sixth and

one in the seventh, but lost by one run. Andrews, pitching for New York, allowed eight hits, while Russell, Moore, Welland and Donohue yielded nine.

The Cleveland Indians came from behind to score three runs in the seventh and defeat the Chicago White Sox, 7 to 5. Glen Myatt, Cleveland catcher, clinched the game with a home run in the eighth.

Detroit at St. Louis was rained out.

In the National League, the Brooklyn Dodgers dropped back into the cellar by losing 13 to 6 to the Philadelphia Phillies. Chuck Klein, Phillie right fielder, stimulated a seven-run rally in the second by blasting a homer with the bases loaded. He also hit two doubles and a single in four times at bat. Van Mungo, rookie pitcher, was the victim. He was replaced by Heimach. Despite the one-sided score, Brooklyn actually out-hit the Phillies, garnering 14 safeties to Philadelphia's 13, but they did not bunch them.

Bunching six of their seven hits in the first three innings, the Cincinnati Reds took their second straight game from the Pittsburgh Pirates, 6 to 4.

The New York Giants played sloppy baseball, and five errors aided in giving the Boston Braves an 8 to 3 victory. Urkanski, Braves' short stop, was the hitting star. He banged out three singles in five times at bat, pushing across three runs. Doubles by Ott and Terry resulted in two of New York's three runs.
