95 HORSES ARE ELIMINATED FROM FIELD OF 115

Ninety-five of the 115 American racing thoroughbreds originally nominated for the fifty-eighth running of the Kentucky derby have fallen by the wayside, leaving a field of twenty contenders. It is taken for granted that the field will be further reduced by scratches before the barrier is sprung, for owners of horses having little chance against the top-notchers scheduled to start will think twice before paying the \$500 starting fee, as racing has been hard hit by the depression. The following nominees with their winter book odds are left in the running: Top Flight, 7-1; Tick On, 6-1; Burning Blaze, 7-1; Liberty Limited, 15-1; Burgoon King, 15-1; Gallant Sir, 15-1; Stepenfitch, 15-1; Brother Joe, 20-1; Sweeping Light, 25-1; Curaco, 25-1; Universe, 25-1; Lucky Tom, 25-1; Fairno, 30-1; Brandon Mint, 30-1; Barcelona Pete, 30-1; Economic, 30-1; Cathopa, 40-1; Prince Hotspur, 50-1; Delivered, 60-1; Springsteel, 100-1. Judging from past performances, Brundon Mint, Delivered, Economic, Universe, Sweeping Light, Brother Joe, Fairno, Stepenfitch, Cathopa and Burgoon King can be eliminated from the contenders. Of the ten left you can hardly class Gallant Sir and Curaco with such speedsters as Burning Blaze, Top Flight and Liberty Limited, although with racing luck they are possibilities. Bookmakers who are offering 100 to 1 on the chances of Springsteel are inviting a lot of trouble, for if this gallant colt runs back to the race in which he decisively defeated the contenders, he will be somewhere near the payoff window when the race is over. Lucky Tom, winner of the Louisiana derby, merits plenty of consideration. He is a strong colt, can run any distance over any kind of a track. He gave the leading juveniles of 1931 plenty to think about in the races he ran on the Chicago and Kentucky courses last fall. Prince Hotspur, a sensational speedster in this morning's trials, will be making a lot of them quit if he retains his present sharp edge. The Prince, accompanied by Lucky Tom, is expected to step out in front and set a dazzling pace that will take the heart out of a lot of good talent before the half-mile mark is reached. As they shape up now, it looks like the ten contenders will finish in the following order: (1) Burning Blaze, (2) Top Flight, (3) Springsteel, (4) Liberty Limited, (5) Tick On, (6) Lucky Tom, (7) Prince Hotspur, (8) Barcelona Pete, (9) Gallant Sir, (10) Curaco; providing the barrier is sprung on a fast track.

In the event she is returned a winner, her name will go down in racing history beside those of Pompey, Distracted, Gallant Fox, and the mighty Grand, past winners of the Wood Memorial. Burning Blaze, fast western speedster that stands a corking chance in the Derby, will have his final test against contention today at Churchill Downs, America's most famous race track. The Blaze should romp home with little difficulty as he has nothing particular to beat. Liberty Limited, once of the Three D's stable, will probably be when the field parades to the post for the Kentucky classic a week from today. This fellow has staled off in his training and it is not likely that Trainer Johnny Schorr will jeopardize his future usefulness by racing him when he is not at top.
