MILLION DOLLAR ROAD

THE PLEASANT feeling that comes with the knowledge that the other fellow is pulling for the same thing you are, is again experienced by Las Vegas, Boulder City and the rest of this area in the announcement of the "million dollar" road which will eventually link Kingman with the highway across Hoover dam.

Senator Hayden and Secretary Wilbur are talking over plans for this project, and Mohave county, Clark's next door neighbor across the Colorado river, is planning to start work as quickly as possible.

When completed this proposed road will fill another gap in the Canada-Mexico highway. One other great link must yet be built by Nevada between Caliente and Glendale. This job will start before the year is out.

The Mohave county highway will virtually parallel the present road, which, according to a letter to Sen. Ashurst of Arizona, "already has constant traffic," but which "can hardly be considered safe for the heavy increase expected when the project (Hoover dam) is completed."

The interior department chieftain also pledges his support to any feasible program Arizona may outline for the speedy construction of such a highway.

GOOD PLACE FOR MOBMEN



WHY THE INTEREST

JAPAN, striking indirectly at the superior naval force alloted the United States by treaty, has started an offensive against all aircraft carriers and ships equipped with landing decks.

American authorities point out that such a clause would strengthen the Japanese navy, but would materially cripple the United States' ocean forces as the latter is charged with the protection of far-flung possessions.

Under treaty terms, America may build 150,000 tons of aircraft carriers; Japan is limited to but 81,000 tons.


