NEW BOOKLET TELLS STORY OF COLORADO RIVER EXPLORERS

An interesting booklet, entitled "The Story of the Hoover Dam," the first of a series being published by the Ingersoll-Rand company, is just off the press.

The booklet tells the early history of the developments leading up to the selection of the dam site. It also gives a brief resume of the hardships encountered by the surveyors and government bureau employes while making a minute survey of the terrain along the shores of the Colorado.

Profusely illustrated, the booklet also gives much interesting information about the disastrous floods of 1916, when the Colorado left its banks and ravaged the city of Yuma, Arizona, and did heavy damage in the Imperial valley of California.

The Ingersoll-Rand company has furnished much of the compressed air and heavy drilling equipment being used on the Hoover Dam project.

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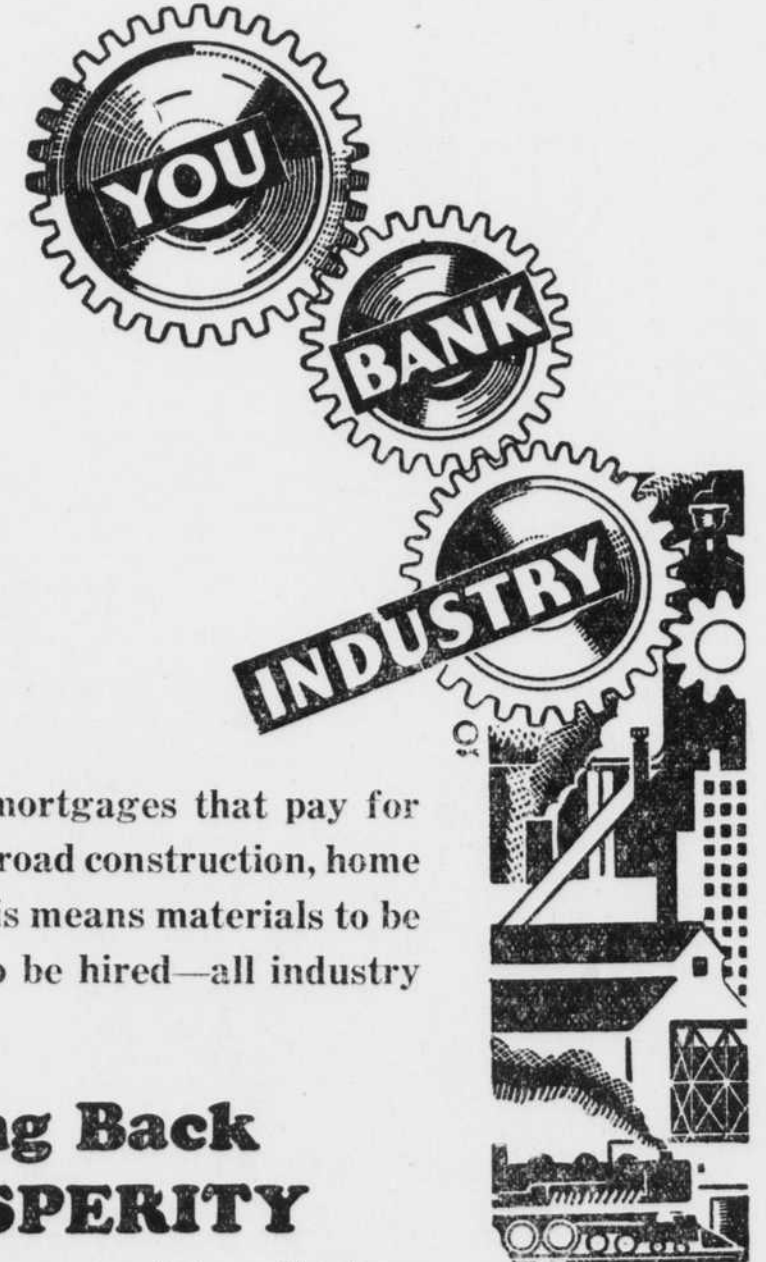
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
