IMPERSONATOR OF OFFICER IN TOILS OF LAW AT BOULDER; HE ATTEMPTED TO 'BORROW' CAR

D. B. Hodge was lodged in the Boulder City jail on Monday morning after attempting to impersonate an undercover man, supposedly under the direction of U. S. Marshal Jake Fulmer, according to Chief of Police Glen E. Bodeff.

Shortly before Hodge was apprehended by reservation rangers, he attempted to borrow a car from an unsuspecting Boulderite on the strength of a badge he displayed.

Hodge, who is now being held for investigation, was arrested in Las Vegas on January 10 on charges of carrying concealed weapons and impersonating an officer. He was tried and found guilty, and in lieu of paying a fine of \$100, served 50 days in jail.

RANCH SURVEY BEING MADE HERE

tins giving price series bearing on Salt Lake and Los Angeles markets.

The survey will include a historical, physical and economic canvas as well as deal with the several physical and economic social factors of this area. A complete description of the county will be given including climate, soil, water and sub-surface water.

A report will also be made on the utilization of land to the best advantage, the market for products raised here, and production trends. The rural and urban population of Las Vegas and Clark county will be analyzed, with due consideration being given to locations and trend of city population, size of communities and community development.

Farm organization and income will play no small part in the survey. Farms will be grouped by

types, governed by size, cropping system, livestock on range and soil.

The more important specific problems confronting the extension service, which is cooperating with the Agricultural Experiment station, which is making the survey, are:

SCOPE OF SURVEY

1. How much can intensive dairy and cash farming displace present extensive livestock production?
2. How much water is available in the major valley areas? The seasonable and yearly nature?
3. How much crop production will the annual inflow of this water, both surface and sub-surface, support?
4. Will the maximum land acreage that can be irrigated maintain a satisfactory community from the standpoint of furnishing social and educational advantages at reasonable cost?
5. What crops can be expanded into the competitive national market and how far?
6. What immediate changes are impending in the local market, due to the construction of Hoover dam?
7. Could additional settlers be satisfactorily absorbed on the remaining lands of the Moapa and Virgin valleys?
