PREMIERE SHOWING TO MARK PALACE THEATRE'S OPENING

Opening Thursday night at 7 o'clock Las Vegas' newest showhouse, the Palace theater, on south Second street, will present a world premiere showing of "Two Seconds."

With the exception that this is the first showing of Edward G. Robinson's latest starring vehicle, anywhere, the opening of the new theater will be without ceremony or "frills." There will be no advance in prices for the opening.

Released by Warner Brothers some 45 days ahead of the regular showing throughout the country, the film for "Two Seconds" is being rushed to this city by air express to arrive in time for the premiere. It is a melodramatic story of the building of a huge skyscraper. On the same program will be a cartoon, a comedy, and a Universal news release.

Smoking will be allowed in the balcony of the new theater. A policy of changing pictures four times each week was announced last night by the management, whereby pictures will be shown on Sundays and Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays, and one-day runs on Saturdays. Matinees will be shown on Tuesdays, Thursdays, Saturdays and Sundays.

Additional features of the Palace will be the new type, all-electric, R. C. A. sound equipment, the Graham McNamee-Universal news reels and Pathe news.

Harold Swanson, projection operator, arrived in Las Vegas Saturday. Formerly with the Mack Sennet projection department, he is said to be an expert at that work and will be handling the latest type of equipment.

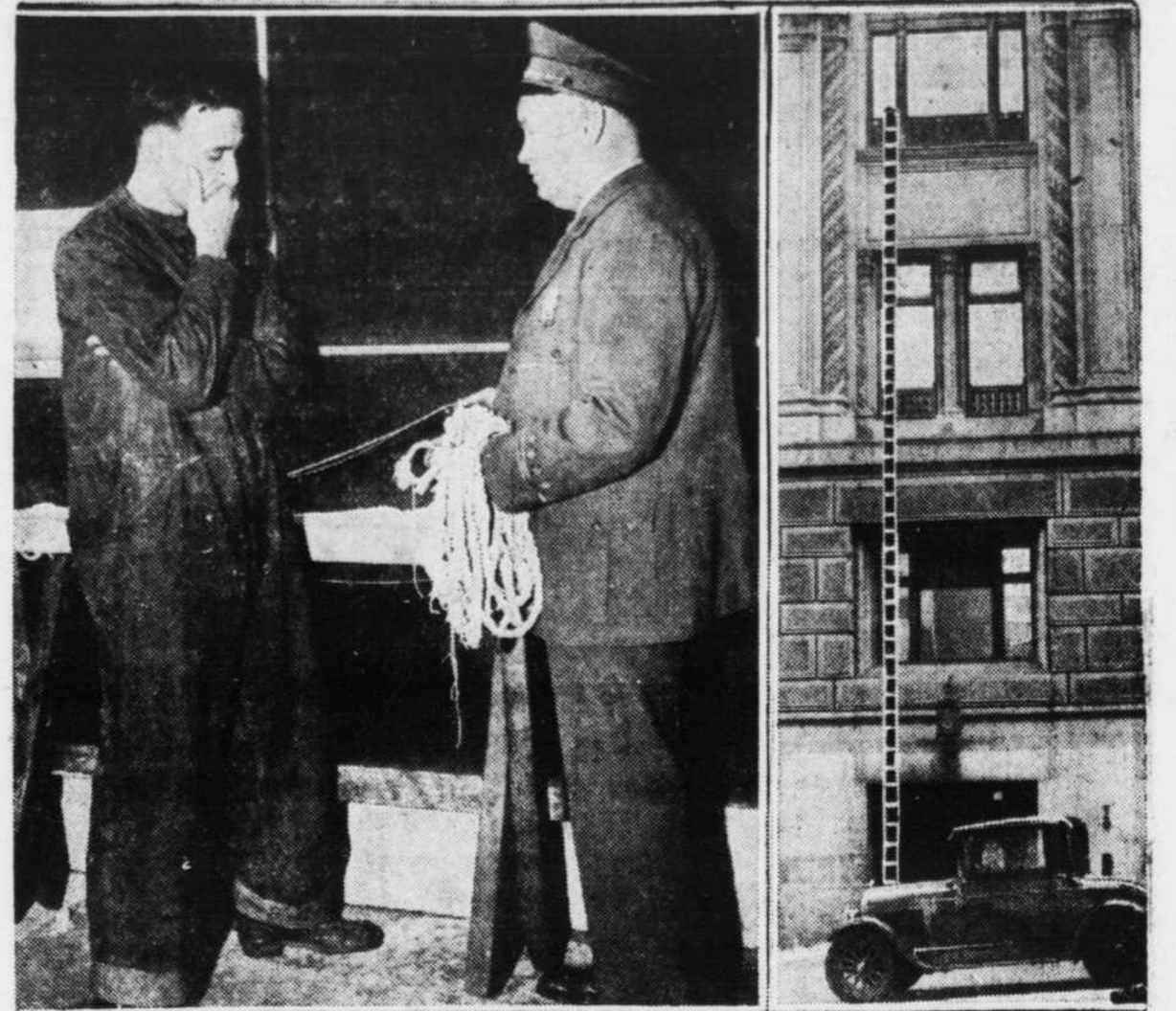
THRILLS WANTED BY GIRL RACER

HARVARD OARS WIN OVER M. I. T.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., May 3. (U.P.)—Harvard crews today made a clean sweep of four races with Massachusetts Institute of Technology on the Charles river.

The veteran Harvard crew, undefeated last year, vanquished Technology crew over the mile and three-quarters distance by a length and three-quarters. Harvard's time was 9 minutes, 27 1-5 seconds, fast in view of the choppy water and a fairly stiff northeast breeze which came up toward sunset. The Technology time was 9 minutes, 31 1-5 seconds.

STADIUM SEEKS M'LARNIN BOUT

CHICAGO, May 3. (U.P.)—The Chicago stadium will attempt to match the winner of the Billy Petrolle-Bat Battalino bout at the Chicago stadium May 20 with Jimmy McLarnin, Vancouver, B. C., welterweight, here in early June, Matchmaker Nate Lewis said today.

Negotiations for a welterweight title bout between Champion Jackie Fields and McLarnin have fallen through because of Fields' unwillingness to meet McLarnin. The stadium also has under consideration a lightweight title bout between Tony Canzoneri, 135-pound champion, and Tony Herrera, El Paso, Tex.
