Bishop Jenkins To Lay Cornerstone Of St. Christopher's Church Sunday At Boulder, Assisted By Rev. Kean

Sunday afternoon at 3 p. m. the Right Reverend Thomas Jenkins, Bishop of the Episcopal church of Nevada, will lay the cornerstone of St. Christopher's Episcopal church, to be erected at Arizona and Utah streets, Boulder City.

Construction work will start immediately and it is hoped that the edifice will be completed by July 1. The building will be of concrete block and stucco, modern in every detail and will cost approximately \$5,000.

Bishop Jenkins is enroute to his home in Reno, after having attended the House of Bishops of the Episcopal convention in Garden City, Long Island, New York.

The Rev. Kean of Christ Episcopal church in Las Vegas will assist the bishop at the rites.

ODDIE TO ASK STATE RIGHTS

Nye Wilson, secretary of the Las Vegas Chamber of Commerce, is in receipt of a telegram from Senator Tasker L. Oddie, which reads as follows:

"Your wire of May 3 received. On April 12, Secretary Wilbur transmitted a report to Senator Thomas, chairman of the senate committee on irrigation and reclamation, opposing the enactment of the bill I introduced, number 2885, to protect the interests of the state of Nevada on the Boulder Canyon project.

"At the same time the secretary transmitted a form of the bill which he suggested to improve the situation. This I have analyzed and find that it does not extend mining and labor laws of Nevada to the reservation, nor does it insure the rights of the state of Nevada to tax private property within the reservation.

"The bill proposed by the secretary, in my opinion, in no way safeguards the interests of the state. I am going to make a determined fight for consideration and enactment of the bill I have introduced, despite the adverse report of the Interior department. I am mailing you a copy of the report and bill suggested by Secretary Wilbur."

DORADO MINE STARTS WORK

Beginning yesterday, the Southern Nevada Mining company started producing ore from their mine located in El Dorado canyon at the rate of 30 tons daily. Every effort will be made to continue this rate of production.

The mine now being worked by the company was taken over from the Rand interests. It was previously known, by that name. Ore is being taken from a 50-foot ledge in the Williams tunnel. The ledge is 4 feet, 9 inches in depth, according to P. L. Williams, Jr., manager of the mining company.

Assays reveal an average of \$31.50 per ton for the ore, gold content running 1.44 ounces per ton and silver six ounces per ton.

WOODARD AID IN GIVING WATER IS GOOD TO CAMPERS

The generosity of J. W. Woodard, McGrath tract property owner, in supplying some 90 families or campers and squatters with a source of water supply, averted what might have easily been a serious situation in the Vegas Verde area yesterday.

These families, most of whom were forced to leave the Boulder City reservation when the stringent rules relative to the abolition of tents and flimsy wooden shacks was enforced, had been obtaining their water from the cemetery public faucet. This faucet was padlocked recently and since that time the campers had been forced to do without water unless they brought it in by automobile. Since most of them are virtually penniless, this was impossible.

Mr. Woodard's property contains a large flowing well, and when he learned of the plight of the families, he offered them the use of the water free of charge.

BIDS FOR BULKHEADS, STONEY GATES AND HOISTS OPENED AT DENVER; TOTAL IS \$287,655

Bids totaling \$287,655 for bulkheads, stoney gates and hoists for use on the Hoover dam diversion tunnels, were announced yesterday by the Denver office of the Reclamation bureau.

Independent Bridge company of Neville Island, Pa., were low bidder on the installation of two bulkhead gates, 48 feet by 50 feet, for use at the intake ends of tunnels number one and four. The bid was for \$160,730.

Low bid for two stoney gates, 50 by 35 feet, for use at outlet ends of tunnels 3 and 4, was submitted by the Lakeside Bridge and Steel company of Milwaukee. Their bid called for an expenditure of \$25,931.

Hardie Tones of Birmingham, Ala., submitted low bid for the construction of two hoists for bulkhead gates. The figure submitted was \$60,995.

The Reading Iron company of Reading, Pa., submitted a bid of \$22,500 for the construction of hoists for two stoney gates.

Bids will be sent to the Department of the Interior officials at Washington for approval. It is expected that contracts will be awarded within the next two weeks.

According to Reclamation engineers, each of the two stoney gates will weigh 235,000 pounds. Construction work on the hoists, bulkheads and stoney gates will not be completed before 1934.

JAP HITS AT U. S. VESSELS

GENEVA, May 4. (U.P.)—Hiroo Saito, suave, smiling Japanese diplomat, subjected the United States defense of aircraft carriers to a battering but good-natured attack today in the naval commission of the disarmament conference.

Senator Claude Swanson, who previously had presented the American claims that aircraft carriers are "defensive" weapons, puffed furiously on his cigar during Saito's speech, but the United States senator received no support from other members of the commission except the partial aid of the British delegate.

SILENT ROOM IS MYSTERY

STOCKHOLM, May 4. (U.P.)—The dramatic and often-times fantastic undercover financial deals which the late Ivar Kreuger directed from behind the locked doors of his famous "silent room" were sketched tonight in the first report of the police investigation into the affairs of the Swedish match king.

On one occasion, Kreuger summoned to the "silent room" two of his associates, Carl Lunge and Sven Hedin, both now under arrest, for having aided the financier in "fraudulent" deals which led to collapse of his world-wide organization and his own suicide in Paris.
