President Hoover, in his second emphatic message to congress in two days, yesterday appealed to the people of the nation for support in balancing the national budget.

He declared the task of balancing the budget "is an issue of the people against delays and destructive legislation which impair the credit of the United States."

"It is also an issue," he said, "between the people and the locust swarm of lobbyists who swarm the halls of congress seeking selfish privilege for special groups and sections of the country, misleading members as to the real views of the people by showers of propa-

It is a vigorous challenge to congress to drop polities for a time and work at their jobs as servants of the country.
