PRESIDENT OF FRANCE IS SLAIN

Prof. Gosset, who had attended Doumer, told the United Press: "We did everything science allows, but failed to prolong his life. We performed a lomber puncture and sustained the heart with camphor oil. He died without suffering."

The first rays of dawn were breaking over the city as an automobile hearse carried the body to the presidential palace.

Premier Andre Tardieu remained at the hospital comforting the president's widow. Others at the bedside when Doumer died were his daughter, M. Emery, Andrew Francois Pietri, minister of national defense, and Albert Mahieu, minister of the interior.

It was announced that as a result of the president's death, his apparently insane assassin, Dr. Paul Gorgonoff, would be charged with first degree murder.

In accordance with the constitution, the national assembly must meet at Versailles within eight days to elect a successor to Doumer.

It is likely that Albert Le Brun, president of the senate, will be named president of the republic. He has been a member of parliament since 1909 and a senator since 1920.

morphine, the last hours of the 75-year-old patriarch would have been intensely painful. But his physicians kept him under the opiate's spell until the end.

Doumer was conscious for a total of only four minutes out of the thirteen hours between the shooting and his death. On one occasion he asked what had happened and was told that he had been struck by an automobile.

His last hours were spent in a simple white iron bed in a small room on the first floor of Beaujon hospital, across the street from Solomon Rothschild's mansion, where he had been attacked yesterday afternoon by the crazed Russian.

Mme. Doumer left the hospital at 5 a. m., leaning heavily on the arm of her daughter.

Her husband's body had preceded her to the palace along the same streets which he had traversed 14 hours before en route to the charity book sale at the Rothschild mansion.

Although official announcement must await a meeting of government dignitaries later today, it is likely that Doumer's state funeral will be held on Wednesday of next week. Meanwhile his body will lie in state a part of each day at the Elvasser malade.

Paul Doumer, the second French president to die by assassination, enjoyed more honors and suffered greater tragedy during the 44 years of his political career than perhaps any other distinguished Frenchman.

A quiet, sagacious politician sometimes compared to Calvin Coolidge, Doumer first entered parliament in 1898 and for the rest of his life with brief exceptions held political positions.

The story of his sacrifice of four sons in the World War is tragic even in France, where every family felt some loss in the four years of fighting.

His first son, a young artillery officer, died in the early days of warfare. Two other sons started in the trenches, and when they had been gravely wounded, volunteered for aviation service. Both rose to the rank of captain and both fell in the same combat in the skies.

The fourth son, a major, died a few days after the armistice of the effects of gas inhaled while caring for wounded comrades.

Doumer was born March 2, 1857, at Aurillac, department of Cantal. He became a professor and then a journalist and finally entered political life as chief of staff of M. Ploquet, then president of the chamber. He entered parliament from Chateau Thierry in 1889, but was defeated the next year. In 1890 he returned as deputy from Laon.

His first cabinet portfolio was minister of finance in 1905, when he drafted the first income tax project. He was governor of Indo-China from 1906 to 1902, and after returning to parliament, was elected president of the chamber of deputies in 1906.
