MARKETS AT A GLANCE

United Press Financial Writer NEW YORK, May 6. (U.P.)—Booming markets for stocks and commodities today announced the country's confidence in an early solution of the tangled budget and tax problems.

Stocks shot up 1 to 5 points, followed by a buoyant spirit in bonds. Wheat jumped a cent a bushel and cotton almost a dollar a bale. Rubber skyrocketed more than 80 points. Coffee, sugar and cotton oil advanced.

News that President Hoover finally had got out the "big stick" to make the congressional bad boys knuckle down to the job of balancing the national budget started a real, old-fashioned bull market on the stock exchange floor.

The rally, bigger than any in the last three months, picked up momentum when the house ways and means committee turned thumbs down on the Patman soldiers' bonus bill and frowned on all other bills that would involve plunking out cash on veterans' adjusted service certificates at the time.

It was not until the U. S. Steel Corp. announced its second wage reduction that shorts got a real scare and scrambled to cover. Prices zoomed as a result and trading picked up so much that the tickers ran behind for the first time in many weeks.

Oil stocks set the pace for the market most of the day, spurring sharply on a run of bright spots that included advancing gasoline prices, resumption of dividends by Ohio oil and reports of progress in two leading mergers of the industry—the one of Jersey and California Standard and that of Jersey and the properties of Pan-American "rete."

Pan-American "B" soared nearly 9 points. Net gains of more than a point each were made by Standards of California and Jersey and Texas Corp. Oil company bonds advanced, as did oil shares on the curb exchange.

The 15 per cent wage cut by Steel, following that of 10 per cent last September, diverted attention to other sections of the list just before the close and oils were crowded out for market leadership. Steel common soared more than 3 points to above 31.

American Telephone jumped above par for a rise of more than 4 points. American Can and Auburn Auto made gains of nearly 5 points each. Allied Chemical closed at 56½, up 5. In the railroad section Union Pacific shot up more than 4 points, while utilities were featured by Consolidated Gas, North American and Public Service, with net gains of 2 to 4 points.

Closing prices were right around the top levels of the day. General Motors jumped to 11½ and closed at 11½ for a net gain of more than a point. General Electric closed at 15½ points higher at 14½. Westinghouse, at its close of 24½ was 2½ points higher than at yesterday's final gong.

FRIDAY IN CONGRESS

SENATE Passed the Hale bill proposing to construct the American navy to London and Washington treaty levels. The measure carries no appropriations.

Finance committee completed billion dollar tax bill. Donald Rietberg, attorney for the Railway Labor Executives association, reiterated his opposition to the nomination of James H. Wilkerson to the circuit court bench in Chicago, before judiciary sub-committee.

Herbert U. Feibelman, of Miami, Fla., told a sub-committee that Miami authorities had been under such pressure to enforce the prohibition law that they had not had time to consider proposed administration changes in the bankruptcy laws.

HOUSE Several attorneys appeared before foreign affairs committee to urge favorable action on a resolution providing contribution by the United States toward expenses of the world court.

Ways and means committee adversely reported the Patman soldier bonus and other veterans compensation legislation.

Rep. Knutson, Repp., Minn., introduced a bill proposing to cancel all interest on loans contracted by veterans on adjusted service certificates.
