CROWD ATTENDS LEGION HOME DEDICATION; FIRST NAILS ARE DRIVEN BY YOUNG, SHEA, CROWE

More than 500 men, women and children attended the building dedication services of the Boulder City American Legion's new \$5,000 hall at 6:30 last night.

The ceremonies were opened with a selection, "Triumph March," played by Post 31 band, under the baton of Director Littler.

Invocation was asked by the Rev. Father Hogan, chaplain.

Walker R. Young, chief construction engineer for the Bureau of Reclamation, was the first speaker. After extolling activities of the American Legion post, Young pledged the cooperation and support of his department of the government to the local post.

When called upon to speak, Frank T. Crowe, superintendent of construction for the Six Companies, who is a man of action rather than of words, addressed the gathering by saying:

"I just guaranteed to drive the nail."

He followed this with a few remarks commendatory to the local Legion post.

Chief of Police Glen E. Bodell, who was elected district commander of the southern district of Nevada, at the Ely convention last week, gave a short talk.

Legionnaires Allen, Harrison, Zeller, Hanson, Luce and Stevens, representing the building committee, were requested to mount the platform and make their bow.

Following this, the color guard was presented and call to colors was sounded by a bugler.

The crowd was then shifted to the scene of the driving of the first nails used in the actual construction of the building.

To Walker R. Young went the honor of driving the first nail and by actual count, exactly 13 strokes of the hammer were made. The second nail was driven by Frank T. Crowe, who accomplished the feat using only nine strokes of the hammer.

The third nail was driven by Charles A. Shea, Six Companies' director. Mr. Shea, a diplomat to say the least, evidently did not want to wrest the nail driving honors from Crowe, nor was he willing to submit to being bested by Young, drove the third nail using twelve strokes, most of which hit the nail on the head.

Parson Tom Stevenson was next called upon to ask a prayer, which was followed by the closing number, "The Star Spangled Banner," played by the Legion band.

The membership of the Boulder City post number 31 had reached 378 up to last night, and it is expected that the 400 mark will be passed before the tenth of the month.

VERDICT GIVEN IN DAM DEATH

John Moore, 32, died early Sunday morning in the Boulder City hospital from the result of an accident while working in upper number four tunnel.

The accident, which took Moore's life, happened Saturday about midnight when the unfortunate man was caught between a large concrete dump bucket and the tunnel wall. The bucket, suspended from a crane which is mounted on a truck, was used in pouring concrete for the bench which supports the invert jumbo.

As the crane swung around the bucket pinned Moore against the tunnel wall crushing his body and fracturing his skull and jaw.

Moore was immediately rushed to the Boulder City hospital where every effort made to save his life was futile.

The coroner's jury, headed by Coroner Frank M. Ryan, returned a verdict of "accidental death while working in line of duty." The body will be sent to Picher, Oklahoma, for burial.

Moore, a resident of the Oklahoma city, is survived by a wife and two small children.
