ABERCROMBIE DIES; THRASHER FACES MANSLAUGHTER CHARGE

John Abercrombie, 27, Six Companies truck driver, died in the Boulder City hospital at 8:35 last night from injuries received when the truck he was driving was sideswiped by one of Anderson Brothers' supply trucks, driven by John Thrasher.

Despite the valiant efforts of Dr. Haas and his staff to save Abercrombie's life, the unfortunate man, whose skull was fractured, developed pneumonia which complication hastened his death.

Oscar Williams whose skull was fractured in the same accident, is hovering between life and death. He, however, has a chance for recovery.

John Thrasher, who is being held by Boulder City police, will be taken before U. S. Commissioner W. J. Flowers and charged with manslaughter this morning.
