ALL OVER the world officers of the law of every nation are engaged in the work of finding those who so ruthlessly kidnaped and killed the little son of Col. and Mrs. Lindbergh.

Although more than two months have elapsed since the child was taken, there are certain clues by which officers hope to be able to find the right men and convict them of the horrible crime.

Through "Jafsie" and others who had, it is established, contacts with the kidnapers, there are possible means of linking them with the crime.

In every city and country in the world the best detective talent is directing its attention to watching every suspicious movement of every known criminal. President Hoover has turned the attention of the army of United States secret service men to the task.

So we have faith to believe that in some way justice will be meted out to the slayers of the Lindbergh child.

And, perhaps, the life of the boy was not too great a price for the world-wide revolution against the gangster type of criminals which we observe surging to the boiling point on every side.

A CLEVER SCHEME

A LITTLE bunch of young fellows with a few battered Fords have taken pattern after Coxey's army of nearly forty years ago and are driving to Washington to secure the passage of the two billion dollar soldier's bonus bill.

The group found easy pickings in Las Vegas and, we are told, secured provisions, gas, sleeping quarters and everything needed to help them on their way.

The group in no way represents the ex-service men. Their movement is not sponsored by either the American Legion or the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Moreover, it is quite probable that none of them will ever reach Washington and that most of them have no intention of going there. And if they were all in Washington now, they would have not the slightest effect or influence on the course of legislation.

We have no particular objection to letting the gang beat their way back east if they want to go east, but people should not allow themselves to be imposed upon as were some good people of Las Vegas who tenderly ministered to the wanderers.

ENCOURAGEMENT

THE DEADLY lethargy which for a time seemed to enfold every enterprise, is beginning to stir and show some signs of life.

The petty political factional groups of congress by their failure to arrive at a statesmanlike solution of the vital problems, for the solution of which the people have for months been breathlessly waiting, have kept the country in a state of unrest.

President Hoover's sharp reminder of the duty of the congress, and his appeal to public opinion, have resulted in a quick acceleration of the machinery.

Much of the foolish controversy which has wasted months of valuable time, not of congress only, but of the entire country has been brushed aside. They have suddenly decided that they may just as well complete the work for which they were sent to Washington and adjourn in time to do their politics at the national conventions in June.

Again we have Hoover to thank for speeding up the machinery of progress.

MARKETS AT A GLANCE

NEW YORK, May 13 (AP)—Dumping of railroad stocks was resumed with unabated vigor on the stock exchange today. Alarms were in their glory and the break in rails was accomplished by a general slump.

While considerable mulling was heard about roads being headed for financial rocks, the only concrete piece of news affecting the carriers was a report by the I. C. C. showing first quarter net of 137,000,000, or 20 per cent behind 1931.

Holders of railroad stocks still had a headache from the New York Central and Union Pacific dividend actions and this report apparently extended the pain, such issues as Central, Atchafalaya, B. & O., Union Pacific, Missouri Pacific and others being thrown on the market for what they would bring. They closed with losses ranging to more than three points.

After the session had been in progress a couple of hours, a large line of stocks being carried in Chicago was liquidated, causing heavy declines in stocks like Colgate, Palmolive, Peoples Gas and others.

Selling spread throughout the list and a lot of stocks that were picked up last week in anticipation of a rise were tossed by the board. Announcement of the plan to increase the borrowing power of the reconstruction finance corp. only added to the confusion.

Wall street saw both good and bad in the plan. If demands upon the corporation are not excessive, it was said, it might work out favorably. But should borrowing develop to the extent where the government would have to do indirect new financing and thus disrupt the budget, more trouble would result.

At any rate, there was nothing in view to halt selling of all kinds of stocks. Steel, American Telephone, American Can, Auburn Auto, General Motors, Union Carbide, Public Service, General Electric, Westinghouse, Woodworth and other leaders representative of all groups closed with net losses that ranged anywhere from fractions to three points.

Railroad bonds suffered the same fate as stocks of the carriers and were sold heavily at losses ranging from 3 to 10 points. Other senior securities were unsettled by this, but United States government issues were strong against the trend, being buoyed by the reserve board report of heavy member bank buying of treasury loans.

Commodities divorced themselves from stock market movements. Wheat rallied from an early dip and closed with small gains, while cotton held around the previous closing levels.

KANSAS CITY LIVESTOCK

KANSAS CITY, Mo., May 13 (AP)—Not enough cattle were purchased at the western markets today to establish prices. Most cows sold around \$3 to \$3.50, the only class quoted.

Hog receipts were light, with trade active and prices generally stronger. Kansas City market 5 to 10 cents higher. Top fat hogs brought \$3.30, with bulk of sales \$3.10 to \$3.20.

Sheep prices were steady. Native and Arizona lambs brought \$6.25.

steadily by the automobile containing the Lindberghs, Brockmudde, and Col. H. Norman Schwartzkopf.

Two of the undertaker's assistants stepped from the hearse and lifted out the casket—a light burden. A group of newspapermen were asked politely, but firmly to leave the precincts.

Then the casket was borne into the crematory chapel, followed by the father—walking a little in advance of the others. Lindbergh stood, bareheaded, and watched the burden slowly descend on a silent elevator to the floor below. His head was bowed and his hands were gripped convulsively behind his back.

As the casket disappeared, the colonel turned and went down stairs, still leading this silent funeral party a short flight of stairs that led to eternity.

He watched as the casket rolled into the burning chamber of five clay. He continued to watch as attendants closed the doors and sealed them. He looked, with straining eyes—through the fearful windows of the walled chamber—until the white heat became blinding.
