SENATE
Continued consideration of the billion dollar tax bill.

Secretary of Treasury Mills in a letter to Chairman Peter Norbeck of the banking and currency committee denounced the Goldsborough bill which would stabilize commodity prices at a 1926 level as a "disturbing factor" in economic recovery.

Senator Ashurst, Dem., Ariz., pleaded for abolition of the "archaic un-American and un-republican" rule compelling a two-thirds majority for presidential nomination in the Democratic convention.

Senator George, Dem., Ga., in opposing plans to deal with unemployment relief through the reconstruction finance corporation called for "controlled and managed" currency inflation to restore the purchasing price of the dollar.

A subsidy for the American coal industry was suggested to the ways and means committee today by David Botting, Seattle, Wash., representing west coast coal operators.

The judiciary committee referred numerous kidnaping bills to a subcommittee which meets tomorrow for action.

Speaker Garner expressed the belief the senate could not clear its calendar in time to escape a summer session after the national conventions.
