## And News of The Hoover Dam Project

### WORK IN TUNNELS CONTINUES DESPITE RAPID RIVER RISE; COFFER DAMS PROTECT BORES

With the crest of flood waters of the mighty Colorado entering Boulder canyon, the mad rushing stream raged through Black canyon past the dam site at the rate of 90,000 second feet late last night.

The stage of the river which is now higher than it ever has been since construction of the dam project was started, has reached a height of 26 feet above the floor of the main diversion tunnels. Notwithstanding this fact, concrete lining work is going on uninterrupted, the flood waters being kept out of the tunnels by means of concrete barriers, which were erected at the tunnel mouths several weeks ago.

The Six Companies railroad trestle, used to transport gravel from the Arizona side of the river, was reported intact at a late hour last night, however it is doubtful, according to Six Companies engineers, whether the bridge will stand the tremendous pressure of the raging waters and the ever increasing amount of debris that is piling up against the wooden structure. Should the bridge be washed away, work at the gravel washing and grading plant will not be stopped, as a large surplus of raw gravel has already been stored at the plant in anticipation of the bridge being destroyed by the flood.

### 6 COS., STINSON CASE SET ON SEPT. 1

The case of Six Companies, Inc. vs. A. J. Stinson, state inspector of mines, and other state officers, will be heard in federal court in Carson City on September 1, according to word received yesterday from Judge Frank H. Norcross. Judge Norcross stated that September was the earliest date that would insure the presence of Judge Curtis D. Wilbur and Judge William H. Sawtelle, who will sit with him on the Stinson suit.

It is the endeavor of Six Companies, Inc., to prevent the enforcement of state mining laws on the Boulder canyon project, federal reservation. They also seek to prevent F. C. DeVinney, tax collector, from selling the company's property in this part of the state for tax delinquencies.

A preliminary injunction was issued by the three-judge court last week restraining the state mining inspector from compelling the Boulder canyon contractors to obey the Nevada statutes relative to the use of gasoline underground and other safety measures detailed in the state mining laws. The injunction will remain in full force and effect until disposition of the case and after the trial.
