Oh, For A Life On The Rolling Deep



James Gleason, Bill Boyd and Robert Armstrong who seem to be having a bit of trouble with something other than a battleship in a scene from "Suicide Fleet," the feature attraction which will be shown at the new Boulder theater today only. NO DANGER TO TUNNEL WORK BECAUSE OF HIGH WATER, SAY OFFICIALS OF SIX COMPANIES

Contrary to sensational reports last night, the railroad bridge of Six Companies, Inc., leading to the gravel pits, is not in danger of being washed out at present levels of the river. There has been no cessation in gravel haul, trains being operated 24 hours a day, according to Six Companies officials.

There has been some collection of debris against the upstream face of the piling, but at no time has there been any danger. A locomotive crane has been kept on the siding near the bridge to loosen driftwood and prevent it from piling up. A bridle has been rigged

up to the bridge, consisting of a three inch steel cable, anchored in concrete blocks on the banks, and with smaller cables attached to the caps and sails of the bridge. This will aid in a large measure in steadying the bridge.

It is interesting to note that at the time of the construction of the bridge, Six Companies engineers calculated in their estimates that they could lose the bridge four times and still be ahead of the cost of installation of a bucket conveyor or previously considered. A pile and trestle bridge is comparatively inexpensive.

Should the river rise to a flood stage of twice the present volume of water the bridge may be carried away. If this occurs, it will not be unusual nor unexpected or hamper in any way the construction of the dam.

Present levels of the river, which contrary to reports of yesterday are not at flood stage, are normal for this time of year. The nearest comparable data, according to best available data, is 1921, when the snowfall and run-off of the river was 140 per cent of normal. Run-off to date has almost exactly paralleled the 1921 figures, which reached a high point in June of 172,000 second feet of water at Topoe, the nearest gauging station to Black canyon. Naturally, predicting the flood stage of the Colorado, wildest of all rivers, either in run-off or in peak stage is pure guesswork, and depends largely upon the weather.

Cofferdams and barricades erected by Six Companies around the tunnel portals are calculated to withstand a maximum flood of 200,000 feet per second, highest recorded flood, before any concern will be felt about danger to work in the tunnels.

CITY MANAGER ELY DESIGNATES MAY 28 AND 29 AS POPPY DAYS

"The American Legion Auxiliary of Boulder City has requested this office to designate Saturday and Sunday, May 28-29, 1932, as "Poppy Days" for this community, and such designation is hereby made, with the deeply earnest approval of the officials of the government.

"The object which these patriotic and charitable women have in view is worthy indeed. It is to fix the attention of everybody on the charity work which the auxiliary is always quietly carrying forward here with extremely limited means, and upon the fact that the liberal buying of poppies is one ready method which everybody will find at hand on the days named for making contributions to the auxiliary's welfare fund.

"It is no doubt generally supposed that in this town of busy people, this town where there are no unemployed, there are no cases of distress. But cases of urgent need, calling for money far in excess of the auxiliary's resources, do exist and are continually arising. Fathers get sick and thereupon run behind financially, and wives and children lack the necessities of life, temporarily. There are cases of motherless homes, fathers working at the river and unable to hire steady help, with the result that little children—mere babies—fail to get proper care. Instances which appeal to the emotions of pity have been brought to my attention.

"The auxiliary is doing the best it can to give relief. These 'poppies' that are to be sold are manufactured elsewhere by disabled veterans, who get one cent—whatever the donor chooses to pay—goes into the treasury of the local auxiliary and will be expended here in charity work.

"I believe that the significance of the poppy is now pretty well known to everyone. But it is worth while to recall that Colonel John MeCrack's poem, "In Flanders Fields," written not long before he himself gave his life to his country, has given a lasting and tender meaning to the poppy.
