RECORDS FALL IN JACK SHARKEY TO BERKELEY MEET LEAVE RING—IF

BERKELEY, Calif., May 21 (AP)—Four meet records were broken and one world's record tied as the University of Southern California ran away with the annual California inter-collegiate today.

Since the Trojans had been favored to win by a wide margin, few spectators showed much surprise when the final score was announced as U. S. C. 83 1-6, Stanford 42 5-6, California 26 2-3 and University of California at Los Angeles, 8 1-3.

Interest in individual performances overshadowed everything else as some of the star athletes who are almost sure of places on the U. S. Olympic games team competed in their last big meet of the school year.

One of the biggest surprises of the day was Bob Kiesel's victory over Frank Wykoff, dubbed the world's fastest human, in the 100-yard dash.

The California flash broke the tape in 9.5, to tie the world's record.

ORANGEBURG, N. Y., May 21 (AP)—Jack Sharkey will retire from the ring in October if he wrests the world heavyweight title from Max Schmeling next month, he told the United Press today.

"I want to be a free man again," Sharkey said. "I'm tired of being told what to do by this person and that person. I want to throw off the fetters and lead my own private life."

He said he would hang up his gloves for good just as soon as he had won the crown and give opponents a shot at it.

"As far as money is concerned," Jack explained, "I can retire right now; I've got enough for that. But I want that title before I quit. I should have had it long ago."

He has not decided what course he will take if he loses, he said, "but there's no danger of that in this fight, with the cry of foul ruled out."

Wykoff, complaining of an injured back, was second.

Halestead of U. S. C. ran the mile in 4:18.9 to set a new meet record. He was 50 yards ahead of his nearest competitor, Ferris, at the finish.

"Blazing Ben" Eastman of Stanford romped to a new meet record of 46.5 in the 440, and Bills, U. S. C., paced the 120 high hurdles in 14.9 for another meet record.

McNaughton, U. S. C., jumped six feet 4 1/2 inches for a new state mark in the high jump.
