MONDAY IN CONGRESS

By United Press SENATE Continued consideration of the tax bill with debate centering about tariff provisions.

Majority Leader Watson criticized group of New York citizens who urged congress to drop partisanship squabbles and enact a relief program.

Senator Earbour, Repn. N. J. introduced a bill designed to provide employment through construction of self-liquidating projects financed by wider utilization of reconstruction finance corporation powers.

Defeated 228 to 169 the O'Connor-Hull bill to legalize beer containing 2 1/2 per cent alcohol by weight.

Speaker Garner said his unemployment relief program met objections advanced by President Hoover in his week-end letter stating his views on self-liquidating projects.

LICENSE PLATES MAY BE COPPER IN '32, WARDEN

Nevada motorists will probably have copper license plates in 1932, according to a statement recently issued by Warden Matt Penrose of the state penitentiary.

Penrose points out the fact that the cost of pure copper plates would only exceed that of the steel plates now in use, by ten cents.

Copper does not have to be coated with a protective covering of paint, to protect it against the elements, therefore the \$74 per hundred pounds it now costs the state to cover the steel licenses, would be eliminated.

The plates, if approved, will be of standard size, finished in the beautiful sheen of pure copper. It is the intention of Penrose to recommend the use of copper to the motor vehicle department for the forthcoming year.

He has had prisoners experimenting with the copper plates for several months and states that the tentative plans for the new licenses puts to shame the copper plates used this year by the state of Arizona.

The Arizona plate, with white letters on copper in its natural color, is hard to read when the sun shines on it.

Warden Penrose found that no such difficulty was experienced in using black or deep blue letters.

worked as a reporter for a number of New York newspapers, lectured, and wrote magazine articles to earn a living.

At the outbreak of hostilities on the continent in 1914, he went to work immediately for Germany.

MURDER ON HIGH SEAS Three British sailors were killed later on the Lamport and Holt liner Tennyson, bound from Brazil to New York, by the explosion of "minerals" said to have been shipped by Duquesne.

It is for this crime that he is charged by the British with murder on the high seas.

Therefore, at the time of his arrest for Arson, in 1917, he was already wanted by England, and probably would have been extradited had it not been for his escape.

As to the man who killed Kitchener, the story is fantastic, wholly unsubstantiated, and yet it is not without the bounds of reasonable possibility.

Lord Kitchener, secretary of war, had sailed for Russia on the Hampshire. Sailing with him, the story goes, was Duquesne, masquerading as a Russian officer.

Duquesne signalled the German submarines by a prearranged signal. Torpedoes were launched. Kitchener died in the swirling waters, and the spy, reaching the submarine on a raft, was hailed inside, taken to Germany, decorated, loaded with honors, and hailed as a hero.

YARD'S MEMORY SHORT LONDON, May 23. (UP)—Scotland Yard officials said tonight they were "unable to recall" the case of Capt. Fritz Joubert Duquesne, who was arrested today in New York after a 13 year hunt.

The officials said they might originally have asked American authorities to apprehend Captain Duquesne, but there had been no recent developments and they had not yet been notified officially of the arrest or identification of the fugitive.

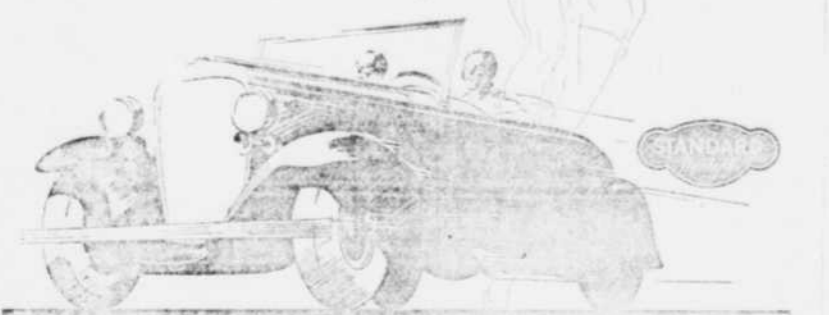
