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LEGION CONVENTION

JUNE 9, 10 and 11 Las Vegas post, No. 18, American Legion, will hold its state convention in Las Vegas.

The success with which the Democratic state convention was handled and entertained should encourage us to do as well by the Legion boys.

We now know that Las Vegas profited in many ways by the attention given to the Democratic convention and it is certain that even more benefit will be derived from the Legion convention.

THE SANTINI MURDER

ONE MONTH ago yesterday, Joseph Santini, pioneer Las Vegas resident, business man and property owner, died as the result of a bullet wound inflicted presumably by underworld characters.

Up to the present time but one suspect has been arrested for the crime and he, it is said, established an "air tight" alibi.

Whatever the motive for the killing, it is obvious that the murderer was well acquainted with Santini and had some strong reason which ought to be obvious to a trained observer of crimes and criminals.

Las Vegas is not a great city like Chicago with a thousand underground channels through which a murderer may escape and hide.

The Age is approaching the conclusion that our peace officers are paying too little attention to the serious crimes with which the community is cursed and, perhaps, too much to the petty offenders who have money to pay fines.

The Santini murder should not be passed over and forgotten. Much future trouble will be saved doubtless if the culprit is apprehended and punished.

AIR NEWS

WESTERN Air Express has just completed six years of air passenger travel between Los Angeles and Salt Lake. Six years ago, on May 23, Fred Kelly, still a pilot for W. A. E., took off from Los Angeles with the company's first passenger for Salt Lake City.

Since that date the planes of the company have flown one hundred million passenger miles. They have carried seventy thousand passengers and have not yet caused a single fatal or serious injury to a passenger.

MARKETS AT A GLANCE

NEW YORK, May 24 (U.P.)—Stocks, bonds and commodities disclosed downward movement today in a wave of discouragement over the general business situation.

A break of almost two cents a bushel in wheat prices was the most unsettling influence, sending stocks off on a quiet downward movement that nearly developed into a rout before the close.

Selling of stocks, that started when reports of rain in the wheat belt toppled grain prices picked up momentum when U. S. government bonds reversed their recent form and sold off. Several "air pockets" in individual stocks were uncovered and when the first going rang all kinds of shares were being tossed overnight.

At the close losses ranged from 1 to 3 points, public utilities sporting the biggest minus signs. Acute weakness in the electric bond & share group sent most utilities down to new lows, including Consolidated Gas and South American.

The American Telephone broke nearly two points to near its bear market low. One explanation advanced to day for the recent disfavor of utilities in the speculative eyes was that in the event of some kind of "inflation," much talked about in government circles, utility companies would probably be adversely affected by having their costs raised without being able to correspondingly jack up their rates.

Food stocks were prominent selling targets again. General Foods being pounded down to a new low at 24 1/2, while substantial recessions were forced in National Biscuits and National Dairy Products.

While the carloadings report showing a big drop in this business, bell-wether for the week ended May 14 added to the weak gloom on Wall street, it had relatively little effect on railroad stocks, most of which stood the selling gaff better than other groups, with the possible exception of the oils.

With cigarette figures indicating decreased consumption, tobacco shares came in for a large part of the selling. American Tobacco & Reynolds Tobacco B. Liggett & Meyers and Lorillard broke to new lows for the year, losses ranging to four points.

Steel, General Electric, Can. Alled Chemical, Westinghouse, Du Pont and other leading industrial sold off moderately in the early trading, but before the close had lost fractions to more than a point as a result of the late selling flurry.

The general list on the bond market followed the government issues to lower levels. Railroad bonds were unsettled by special pressure against St. Louis Southwestern (Cotton Belt) on reports that its reorganization plan was striking a snag because of reluctance of some of the 4 per cent bondholders to deposit their securities, making a receivership imminent.

Cotton prices reacted to weakness in stocks and grains as well as the belated circulation of some May notices and were almost a dollar a bale lower at the close.

Ford Motor Co. adds 600 workers at Columbus assembly plant and increases production schedules at Cincinnati, Chicago and Milwaukee plants.

New York, Ontario & Western railroad reports earnings for year ended April 30, of \$1.70 a share, against \$1.15 a share in the year 1931.

Loft, Inc. reports increase of 9.3 per cent in sales during first four months of 1932 as compared with like 1931 period.

Philadelphia federal reserve bank reports advance of 19 per cent in wage payments in the anthracite industry during April.

American Can Co. increases production schedule at its Newark, Pa. plant.

Western Electric Co. reports April net income of \$156,653, against \$152,161 in April, 1931.

Western New York Water Co. reports gross income for year ended March 31 of \$472,310, against \$425,019 in preceding fiscal year.
