THE SANTINI MURDER

ONE MONTH ago yesterday, Joseph Santini, pioneer Las Vegas resident, business man and property owner, died as the result of a bullet wound inflicted presumably by underworld characters.

Up to the present time but one suspect has been arrested for the crime and he, it is said, established an "air tight" alibi.

Whatever the motive for the killing, it is obvious that the murderer was well acquainted with Santini and had some strong reason which ought to be obvious to a trained observer of crimes and criminals.

AIR NAVIGATION

WESTERN Air Express has just completed six years of air passenger travel between Los Angeles and Salt Lake. Six years ago, on May 23, Fred Kelly, still a pilot for W. A. E., took off from Los Angeles with the company's first passenger for Salt Lake City.

Since that date the planes of the company have flown one hundred million passenger miles. They have carried seventy thousand passengers and have not yet caused a single fatal or serious injury to a passenger.

DAY AND NIGHT TAXE

By OTTO E, STRUM United Press Financial Writer) NEW YORK, May 24 (U.P.)-Stocks, bonds and commodities slid downward today in a wave of discouragement over the general business situation.

A break of almost two cents a bushel in wheat prices was the most unsettling influence, sending stocks off on a quiet downward movement that nearly developed into a rout before the close.

Selling of stocks that started when reports of rain in the wheat belt toppled grain prices picked up momentum when U. S. government bonds reversed their recent form and sold off: Several "air pockets." in special groups of stocks were uncovered and when the final gong rang all kinds of shares were being tossed oevrboard.

At the close losses ranged from 1 to 3 points, public utilities sporting the biggest minus signs. Acute weakness in the Electric Bond & Share group sent most utilities down to new lows, including Con-

solidated Gas and North American. American Telephone broke nearly two points to near its bear market low. One explanation advanced today for the recent dislavor of utilities in the speculative eyes was that in the event of some kind of "inflation," much talked about in government circles, utility companies would probably be adversely affected by having their costs raised without being able to correspondingly jack up their rates. Food stocks were prominent sell-

ing targets again, General Foods being pounded down to a new low at 2414, while substantial recessions were forced in National Biscuit and National Dairy Products.

While the carloadings report showing a big drop in this business bell-wether for the week ended May 14 added to the day's gloom on Wall street, it had relatively little effect on railroad stocks, most of which stood the selling gaff better than other groups, with the

possible exception of the oils. With cigarette figures indicating decreased consumption, tobacco shares came in for a large part of the selling. American Tobacco B, Reynolds Tobacco B, Liggett & Meyers and Lorillard broke to new
